Miss Hager's appearance in Salem last year was a delightful musical event, and it is anticipated that her recital here the last of the month will be an outstanding event in musical circles. Miss Hager has just returned to the United States from a series of concerts in Mexico City where she was accorded a most enthusiastic ovation.

The theme for the conference is "A Sower Went Out to Sow." It will be handled in a series of four talks by Dr. Walter L. Van Nuy, president of the Oregon council of Christian education. He has just returned from a visit to Palestine and the Bible lands which will add to the interest in his talks.
