Miss McIlhenny made her informal discussion unusually interesting with illustrations both at the piano, on large charts, and by having the audience sing a folk song written in 1609. Miss McIlhenny traced the development of the musical figures through the primitive music, and folk songs, to the sonata of Beethoven and outstanding works of classical and modern composers.

Illustrations of musical figures were given by Miss Eleanor Moore, who sang "By the Waters of Minnetonka" (Laurance) with Miss Mildred Gehle at the piano; by Prof. Roberts, who played the "Andante Cantabile" and McDowell's "To a Wild Rose" on the organ; and by four girls from Willamette university, the Misses Grace Henderson, Rosalind Van Winkle, Evelyn High and Helen McPherson, who played the first movement of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony as a two piano number.

Public recognition of the importance of women in the business world is stressed in the observance of national business women's week in which the Salem club is cooperating.

Opening the observance with a radio broadcast from station WJL, Detroit Monday noon Miss Marion H. McClench of Ann Harbor, Michigan, president of the federation, pointed out the difference between the time when "the unmarried woman or widow could look for nothing better than drab years of sub-

servience to a mother or sister or often an "in-law" who could afford to house and support her in return for such free service as she could give," and the more cheerful picture of the present when more than 8,500,000 women have proven their capacity for self-support.

"There are enough women to make a city the size of Cleveland or St. Louis on the payroll of retail stores in this country," said Miss McClench. "They and stenographers would fill the city of Detroit. Over 1,000,000 women are engaged in agriculture and animal husbandry, and as many women in manufacturing as there are in the whole metropolitan area of Philadelphia. If all the women bankers and bank employees were lined up in a single file, they would make a procession three and a half miles long. Over 250,000 women are engaged in transportation; 25,000
