

BYRD PLANNING SECOND TRIP TO SOUTH POLE

Dunedin, N. Z. (UP)—The possibility that Rear Admiral Richard Evelyn Byrd will take another expedition into the Antarctic to further explorations was foreseen here Wednesday.

Admiral Byrd in an interview said: "If I were to say what I am going to do next, my remarks would cause a sensation."

Although the intrepid explorer, who returned Monday after more than a year at the bottom of the world during which he flew over the south pole, declined to commit himself further, the trend of events here and feeling among his party indicate his return to the Antarctic to make further explorations east of the Ross Sea. Although Norwegian and other expeditions are now working west of the sea, it was pointed out that there are vast territories unexplored between the Bay of Whales and Deception Island, the latter the base of Sir Hubert Wilkins in his Antarctic flights.

"I feel under obligation to those who have donated material to this expedition," Byrd said, "and all unused gear will be returned to them."

Byrd, when leaving the British warship Laburnum, after an inspection tour, received a thirteen gun salute, his first Admiral's salute since his promotion.

The government granted Byrd and his party free travel over railroads and the premier's lounge car has been placed at the Admiral's disposal. In a radio broadcast Byrd said that Americans would hold everlasting gratitude towards the people of New Zealand.

SOUTH FRANCE HIT BY SEVERE STORMS

Paris, France, (UP)—Heavy rains, following deep snows, have resulted in floods spreading over southwestern France Thursday, which it is feared may cause a second disaster similar to the one which last week took more than 200 lives and devastated scores of villages.

The Ariz river has overflowed and low lying villages are endangered. The inhabitants of the lower sections of Salles de Bearn near Bayonne were evacuated on account of the rising waters. The streets at Auch were flooded.

The rain, falling incessantly, it was feared, may cause a worse flooding of the Pyrenees valleys.

Indian Maid Denies Killing Mother and Accuses White Youth

Colville, Wash. (UP)—The picture of a pretty Indian maid who repudiated her story of slaying her aged mother and in turn pointed the finger of guilt at her white sweetheart was before the court in these murder trial of Helen Moses.

And another picture may be offered for the jury's consideration when Clarence Hartley, the girl's lover, testifies in the trial which has a background of asserted all-night liquor-gambling carousals at Indian Stick Games.

Colorfully garbed squaws in blankets and shawls and Indian maidens bedecked with lipstick and rouge heard Helen Moses fasten a story of guilt on Hartley without a show of emotion. Apparently it was the fight of one race against another—with the memory of the murder of Mrs. Susie Moses, aged picturesque character, in the minds of all.

The state hopes to prove the girl guilty on the basis of a confession she assertedly made after the crime.

On the witness stand Wednesday the girl said Hartley got "me and mother and two other women drunk."

"Mother tried to get Hartley to go home, but he refused. She took a butcher knife and threatened me unless he left. Then Clarence took a rifle from the corner and killed mother."

She calmly related how they tried to take the body to the Columbia river but found it was too heavy. The youth, according to the girl's story, wanted to drop the body in a well but she contended she "could not treat mother like that."

Not for years has a white man's court created such a sensation among the Indians as this ordeal of this 22 year old girl.

Helen is a full-blooded Colville Indian, one of the few left without a trace of mixed blood. Unusually pretty, she is five feet two inches tall, has a rich olive complexion, and her coal black hair is cut in a becoming Dutch bob.

Throughout the trial she has borne up with the stoicism of her race, but her white education and the influence of the 20th century have been evident in the fact that she smiles on occasion and, when it

needs it, dabs her face in the powder of modern women.

Hartley, a typical young white of the border regions, sophisticated in a backwoods way, appears bored. He yawned when Helen told her version of the killing. Jail is not a new thing for him. He has served terms on several occasions on minor charges.

Most tragic of all are the more than 100 Indians who have come down from the haunts near the border, pitched teepees outside of the town, and, although they know little of what it is all about, lend their moral support to their kinsman in distress.

A strange admixture of the conflict between modern laws and the habits of a vanishing race is unfolding in the small courtroom where Judge Charles H. Leavy of Spokane conducts the trial.

The grunts and "howdas" of the aborigines interrupted the trial twice Wednesday and before the "case" could go on Judge Leavy was forced to order the Indians from the court house. Outside they beckoned and uttered guttural curses. They will remain until the trial is over and then will trek back to their homes.

If Helen is acquitted they will take her back with them and there will be feasting for many days. If she is convicted it will be a re-enactment of the old drama in which one of their number is taken by the white man and they won't know just why.

Of special interest to mother-in-law fanciers is the fact that the husband's mother was placed on trial with him before the micro-

phone for aiding and abetting the beatings of her daughter-in-law. The old woman was given two years in the penitentiary to think about it.

The trial took place in the special radio theater in the newly constructed Post and Telegraph Building here.

PRODUCE ROYALTY**

The first payment of royalty on sand and gravel taken from the Columbia river under the act of the 1929 legislature was made to the state Wednesday, the amount being \$7500. For some years no royalty was received on the Columbia river deposits for the reason that the dredging of the stream was nearly all on the Washington side. It

was known, however, that the material was washed to the Washington side from the Oregon side. Under action of the legislature of the two states in 1929 the state of Washington collects the royalty and divides equally with Oregon. The Oregon bill was introduced by Representative McAllister of Marion county.

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RADIO TRIAL AS CURB TRIED ON WIFE-BEATERS

Moscow, (UP)—To discourage the ancient and heretofore honorable pastime of wife-beating, the Soviet government has just conducted a trial against a wife-beater in Moscow on the radio.

This is the first radio trial on record here. Many trials in the past have been broadcast but this is the first experiment in staging a court proceeding especially for the benefit of the radio audience.

Unfortunately for the experiment the lady in the case did not lend herself readily to the purposes of the program. Mrs. Clavida Sergeyev, face to face with the judges and the microphone, refused to incriminate her violent spouse. She gave him a clean bill of character and tried to explain away tell tale marks on her face and body in other ways.

The neighbors of the Sergeyev family, however, told a story of habitual wife-beating which saved the occasion and won Sergeyev a term of three years in the penitentiary. One of the neighbors quoted Mrs. Sergeyev as saying before the trial that she would not help send her husband to prison, that, in fact, she would prefer to go there herself.

The loving self-sacrifice of the beaten wife, as the judges pointed out, does not jibe with new ideas on women's equality with men. 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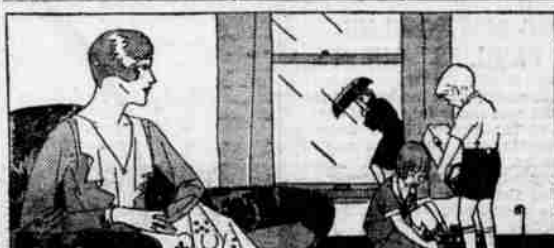
