

# SENTIMENT FAVORS WOODBURN SCHOOL BUILDING

## FIFTY VOTERS TAKE ACTION; COST \$25,000

Woodburn—About 50 of the legal voters of Woodburn gathered at the west side grade school building Saturday afternoon in response to a call by the school board to discuss the matter of building a new schoolhouse. An inspection of the building and its many defects was made previous to the hour of the meeting, which was set for 3 o'clock.

Dr. Thomas Sims, chairman of the school board, presided and briefly told of the purpose of the meeting, which was to get the sentiment of the voters and taxpayers in the matter of erecting a new building. The reports submitted by the bureau of labor and fire marshal were read by F. G. Hagemann, district clerk, and the comprehensive report made by C. L. Huffaker, school building expert of the University of Oregon, was outlined and explained by Supt. V. D. Bain, who also explained the financial situation of the district.

A discussion of the situation followed, during which talks were made in favor of the new building, by C. J. Epp, Paul Mills, Fred Evenden, Mrs. Hiram Overton, H. L. Gill and others.

M. J. Lindahl and E. N. Hall were the only two speakers who were not in favor of the new building, but thought it would be wiser to repair the old one. C. N. Freeman, architect for Portland gave an estimate of the cost of repairs, which would be approximately \$425,000 and stated that to do this would be like throwing good money away and the building would then be very unsatisfactory and would have to be vacated in only a few years if repairs were made.

Plans for a new building of six rooms with furnishings complete were exhibited, which would be erected at a cost of \$25,000, allowing \$1000 for repairs on the east side school, and an outline of the financial condition of the district was presented, showing how the present bonds and proposed bonds could be paid and the district put on a cash basis in 15 years without a higher tax levy than 18.5 mills. The sentiment of the meeting was highly in favor of a new building and a vote was taken to obtain the wishes of those in attendance which showed 24 for the new building and 16 against.

## AUTO DEMOLISHED IN SECOND WRECK

## Woodburn School District Financial Operations May Result In Cash Basis Soon

Woodburn—The Woodburn school district apparently is in good condition to stand the erection of a \$25,000 school building and the adoption of the proposed program would put the district on a cash basis, figures compiled by the clerk of the board reveal.

The warrant indebtedness of the district is \$77,507.74 which will be reduced \$48,000 during the year, leaving warrants outstanding July 1 totaling \$29,507.74. The indebtedness at present is \$25,368.00, outstanding July 1, 1929; \$26,540.84 issued 1929-30 to date and estimated \$15,800 for the remainder of the school year. From this total it is to be deducted \$9,000, leaving an actual indebtedness for the remainder of the year of \$29,507.72. Deductibles include \$7,000 from high school transportation and \$2,000 from additional high school attendance due to transportation.

During the past 11 years the medium tax levy has been 18.5 mills and it is estimated that the special tax levy for 1930-31 will not exceed 18.5 mills. The proposed building would bring the indebtedness to \$50,500, with \$14,000 now outstanding in high school bonds, \$25,000 for the proposed building and \$20,500 (estimated) warrants. Payments would be over a 15 year period and include \$2,000 a year on bonds and \$2,500 a year on warrants.

Under this plan the principal to be paid will exceed the indebtedness by \$8,000 in 15 years which means that the district may be put on a cash basis sooner than that time. Interest on the entire indebtedness is counted the first year with the tax levy at 18.5 mills. On this plan of payment the yearly decrease in interest will be \$250 which will permit a further decrease in the tax levy within a few years. Taxes due and payable will more than cover the warrant indebtedness previously shown. Warrants for four and a half months of the current year have already been paid before any of the taxes for this year have been received.

In early life she taught school in Wisconsin and also taught at The Dalles after coming to Oregon.

Surviving relatives are two brothers, Joe Wilquet of St. Louis, and Henry Wilquet at home; a sister in Wisconsin and a number of nephews and nieces in Canada and Vancouver, Wash. One sister died in Canada several years ago.
