Mother of Silverton Man For Whom Legion Post is Named Will Visit France

Silverton—Mrs. D. E. Reeves of West Hill received her official government invitation to go to the grave of her son, Delbert Reeves, who was killed in action in France on July 18, 1918. The invitation reads:

"The government of the United States extends an invitation to Mrs. D. E. Reeves to make a pilgrimage to the cemetery in Europe where the remains of her son are now interred. Leaving New York on the steamship Harding on July 9, 1930, Mrs. Reeves will arrive in France 12 years nearly to the day after her son was killed. He was slated among the missing for months but later was identified."

He enlisted with Company I at Woodburn, March 29, 1917, and on August 3 was sent to Company M, 23rd Infantry and was promoted to corporal March 6, 1917. He was 24 years old when killed.
