

EIGHT VOTE MARGIN GIVES SCHOOL TO WOODBURN

BOARD MEETS MONDAY NIGHT START ACTION

Woodburn—At the special election held Saturday on the question of a \$25,000 bond issue to build a new grade school on the west side, the bonds carried by a majority of eight votes.

The vote was limited to taxpayers, and out of more than 900 whose names appear as taxpayers in the district but 300 votes were cast. Of these, four were thrown out as defective, leaving a total of 152 in favor and 144 against the measure. The election board consisted of Mrs. Hiram Overton and Mrs. W. D. Simmons, judges; S. E. Brune and C. J. Rice, clerks.

A meeting of the school board will be held Monday evening to arrange the details of the bond sale, advertising for bids and all necessary arrangements, and no time will be lost in getting the actual work of building under way. It is hoped that all arrangements will be completed so that actual work on the new building may begin as soon as the present term of school is closed.

This is one of the most progressive steps taken by the community of Woodburn for many years and will prove to be a big step forward for the Woodburn schools, which have long been the pride of the city.

Barber Takes Air While Amity Is Deserted In Novel Machine

Amity—No doubt a number of passing tourists, glancing casually at Amity's business section Friday morning carried away the impression that here was a community as yet untouched by the glad tidings of the "Hoover Prosperity" proclamation. Deserted streets and empty shops greeted the eye, for our citizenry was, with one accord, out in the great open spaces viewing the latest spring styles in aviation.

A powered glider, the first of its kind to visit this section, was on display here, surrounded three-deep by the air-minded Amityites discussing such technical matters as "tachometers" and "props" while waiting for the intrepid aviator to launch his contraption into the sky.

With the exception of the ample wings which had a tip-to-tip spread of over 40 feet, the remainder of the craft was similar to Kipling's description of Gunga Din's pants—"nothing very much before and a little less than 'alf of that behind." And when the compact, three cylinder engine clinging to the under side of the wings went into action, the result sounded like a Chinese New Year's festival; but the glider pilot, balanced on the strapping framework, whirling the propeller flung in his face, and with a fine disregard for danger and the law of gravity took to the air.

Once upon the glider circled over the town several times, just topping a tall fir and dodging a church spire there, while aged pioneer residents who have seen many strange innovations during their span of years, witnessed the spectacle with many admiring headshakes, recalling Mother Shipton's prophecy, fantastic in the 18th century, that "men through the air like birds shall fly."

Of more than ordinary interest to people here was this close-up view of late model aircraft because the pilot and owner of the glider, Hopkins, was until a few years ago a business man of Amity. The cryptic phrase, "From Barber to Birdman" indicates his change of avocations. In 1927 Hopkins shook off the fetters of torments duties, folded his trusty razor, and hid himself to the airports, there to spend the coveted wings which would lift him to the upper regions toward which he yearned.

Arriving in Amity late Thursday afternoon Pilot Hopkins' glider did not at first show to its best advantage. Knocked down, packed on an auto trailer and swathed in padding at every joint, the craft first gave
