

NORBLAD MAIN FORUM TALKER AT SILVERTON

Silverton—The chamber of commerce open house luncheon held Monday noon at the Reno restaurant was attended by about 75 members and guests.

Mayor L. C. Eastman spoke on Silverton government, outlined the work of the council, urged the cooperation of the citizens, asked attendance at council meetings. He further invited suggestions to be given councilmen by citizens.

He reported that the city finances were in good condition, having now on hand a cash reserve of \$40,000, which is being held to pay obligations maturing in the future. He stated that the only fund which was at all in arrears was the park fund, which is slightly in arrears due to the silver thaw a year ago last winter, breaking hundreds of trees in the park which cost hundreds of dollars to clean out.

Knut Degener introduced Governor Norblad who spoke along the lines of state development, particularly stressing on the importance of advertising Oregon to prospective tourists whom he said were prospective settlers. He advocated routing the eastern tourists over the Old Oregon highway thus capitalizing on the historical interest of this early road.

He urged the construction of complete road systems throughout the state, contending that nothing develops a state more effectively and quickly than making possible most efficient transportation.

He stated that Portland should adopt a broader viewpoint towards the growth of Oregon by advocating the upbuilding of Oregon as a whole, stating that Portland would necessarily grow along with the state.

Governor Norblad did not touch on any political issues.

Norris Ames, president, in behalf of the chamber invited all to come back and bring any and all others interested to attend these luncheons and also the monthly banquets.
