

LINN COUNTY LUMBER TRACT TITLE CHANGE

Albany—Transfer to the Eugene Lumber company of vast timber tracts in the Upper Calapooia river watershed owned during the past year by the Robert Dollar Lumber company, is made in a deed filed in the Linn county recorder's office Wednesday. The instrument of conveyance is a United States marshal's deed.

The timber tracts were acquired by the Robert Dollar Lumber company from the Portland Dollar Lumber company, April 27, 1929, under the hammer of foreclosure of the timber holdings of the Portland Lumber company for a bid of \$1,826,400.

The timber is located in southern Linn and northern Lane counties and is in a strategic position in the path of the Oregon Electric railway extension south and east from Sweet Home.

The Eugene Lumber company is a corporation organized under the laws of Nevada. Its incorporators and officers are not known here.

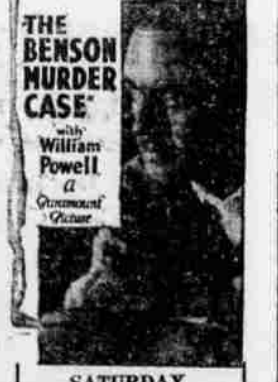
After the program home made candy was sold and altogether about \$25 were cleared for the club fund.
