

### SPEEDWAY ALL READY FOR BIG ALTOONA RACE

Altoona, Pa., (AP)—Patriotic exercises and fast automobiles will share honors here on flag day, June 14, when the Altoona Speedway Corporation and the local American Legion post will cooperate in holding an automobile race.

Legionnaires from posts in all parts of Pennsylvania will participate in the patriotic program before the helmeted speed demons wheel their cars onto the boards for the 200 mile race.

Among the fast drivers who are expected to enter the classic are Lou Meyer, champion of the American Automobile Association for the past two years, and Cliff Bergere, whose motor was "burned out" with victory in sight, last Labor Day. Bergere is at present completing a movie contract of stunt work.

Other entries in the race will probably include "Deacon" Litz; Gordy Condon; Altoona driver and Zeker Meyer, one of the old time racers. Competitive drills for drum and bugle corps are scheduled by the Charles R. Roway post of the American Legion. Prizes will be offered. It was announced.

Officials of the A. A. A., governing body of American speedways, has inspected the Tipton speedway and given complete approval to the changes and improvements in construction which are now underway there.

The big bowl is being partially rebuilt in preparation for the races to be held flag day and September.

The lower ribbon of the track is to be of macedon construction, similar to the materials used in the pits while much new lumber is being placed on the upper decks of the track.

Officials after inspecting the construction under the bowl said the lumber was in good condition.

Windsor, Ont., (AP)—One question, profound and epochal, may face all candidates for public office in campaigns here and in neighboring municipalities: "Who are you for, the dogs or the dog-catchers?"

One Sunday I worked 12 miles in a ter-

rific storm. Simply no roads for a car or even a horse drawn conveyance. I think I have gotten every family in each of the three precincts."
