

STATE PRISON OPEN HOUSE IS ANNOUNCED

Superintendent Henry W. Meyers and other officials of the state penitentiary will be hosts to the people of Oregon next Saturday and Sunday when open house is to be held in the new prison administration building that is now practically complete. The building, a four-story structure, will be occupied early next week.

Located in the new building will be the administrative and industrial offices, guards' quarters, prison arsenal, matron's offices, and, on the top floor, quarters for 50 female prisoners.

Under the direction of the matron, Mrs. Gene Halley, and her assistant, Mrs. Bertha Mathews, a number of these women prisoners are engaged in polishing up the women's quarters. Rugs have been bought for the corridor, and these were being dusted and put in place Tuesday. The new quarters, with baths and other modern conveniences in every room, and with good beds, are better furnished than many hotels, and in color, cleanliness and convenience far ahead of anything many of the women have known "outside."

Corrective needs have not been overlooked, and one room has been set apart especially for the girls who won't be good. Segregation as a precaution against infectious diseases, never before possible among the women in the Oregon penitentiary, is provided in the new quarters.

The new building is considered fireproof. With the exception of windows and doors it is entirely the product of prison labor. This includes plumbing, interior decoration and various artistic features, for example an electric color fountain on the first floor.

The public will be received next Saturday and Sunday between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and 4 p. m. The excavation has been completed for the new cell wing recently authorized by the state emergency board.

GLAND TREATMENT FOR NEURATHENIA

Chicago (AP)—The task of curing that "what's-the-use" feeling that impairs the efficiency of many of the 60,000 employees of the Illinois

Central railroad, has been undertaken by Dr. James H. Hutton, endocrinologist. Dr. Hutton, who assumed his duties Monday, is believed by the railroad to be the first to apply endocrinology to industry. He believes the efficiency of employees will be increased by the other scientific treatment of thyroid, adrenal, pituitary and other glands.

"We want all these 60,000 employees hitting on all six cylinders," Dr. Hutton explained. "My job is to remove the carbon—to treat the glands that cause sickness and low efficiency."

Neurasthenia—that "what's-the-use" feeling—that limits a man's working power, he believes, can be cured by gland treatment.
