School Bell Is Silenced Forever As Crew Launches Attack Upon Old Building

Woodburn—Work of tearing down the old west side grade school building began Wednesday under the direction of Contractor Presthus and the old school bell, which for almost 40 years has called the children of this vicinity, some of whom are now grandparents, to their daily lessons, has been dislodged from its lofty perch and will spend the rest of its days in oblivion, as modern school buildings do not use this antiquated method of designating school time. As a reminder of days gone by a photograph was taken of the old building before the wrecking began.

The new building will be of one story, facing east and will have a frontage of 170 feet and measure 90 feet from front to rear. There will be an open court on the west side, measuring 65 by 50 feet, and according to the plans this may be made into an auditorium at some future time. The building will contain six standard size class rooms, a cafeteria and a boiler room. There will be two double entrances to the front of the building one near the north and the other near the south end and between these lighted by the front windows will be two class rooms. At the south end of one will be a stage, fully equipped and at the north end of the other the library will be situated. Corridors will extend from the two front entrances to the back entrances, from the south corridor the pupil may enter a corner classroom, the principal's office, lavatories and the southwest classroom on the left, and on the right after passing the connecting corridor running at right angles to the main ones, will be found the cafeteria and boiler room. From the north corridor the rooms correspond to those on the south side. The building will be steam heated and the roof will be of slated shingles. It is to be completed by September first.
