Old Railroader Has Wide Range Of Activities

Aurora—Perhaps the most sensational life has been that of George Miller, late of railroad fame. Miller came to Oregon from Bethel, Mo., with his father and mother's family July 7, 1877, and settled in Aurora, where he was employed in the "colony wagon shop" his profession having been that of building wagons and doing all sorts of cabinet work, having learned the trade in Missouri. He worked at the latter trade for about six years.

Miller started working for Southern Pacific railroad company in October 1883 and worked continuously for 42 years and up until he was honorably retired, which was on October 31, 1925. During all the years of railroading Miller's record was one of unusual merit, never having neglected either in receiving or sending a train order, which, no doubt, would have resulted in a serious accident, and in those days, train orders were very numerous. Hop shipments to the eastern states and London was quite an industry years ago, trying work alone, necessitated long, trying hours.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller reared and educated a family of five children. Since Miller's retirement from railroad work, he has devoted much time in reading and writing and finds a great deal of pleasure in beautifying his home and yard.
