West Salem—The plans for the West Salem strawberry festival were progressing very favorably Tuesday, according to Walter D. Cuth, president of the club and with the weather apparently settled for a few days, it is anticipated that this year's festival will be much better than any previous one.

Through an error it was announced the festival would be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week but it is to start Wednesday and continue for the rest of the week. There will be a number of booths in charge of the Community club from which the club will receive all the proceeds and a percentage will go into the club treasury from the carnival attraction receipts.

Many more sports are to be staged this year than previously and it is hoped that there will be a large number of entries in the motor boat races for which cash prizes are to be given.

The carnival this year will be held in the Riverside park at west end of the Marion-Polk county bridge, near the Mellow Moon dance pavilion, where there is plenty of parking space for automobiles.
