Dallas—Thursday morning saw the passing of an old-time resident of Dallas and its neighborhood, when death claimed Sarah M. Greenwood, 84, wife of the late P. S. Greenwood, a veteran of the Civil war and a street commissioner of this city.

Her death occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. H. Harris of Arlie, where she has lived for the past five years.

Mrs. Greenwood was born in Ohio in 1846, and in 1867 she was married at Bethalto, Ill. The family came to Dallas in 1880 and resided here until 1919 when they moved to Seattle.

Seven children, four daughters and three sons survive. They are: Mrs. H. L. Culp, Alton, Ill.; Mrs. E. I. Palmer, San Francisco; Mrs. M. L. Harris, Arlie; Mrs. N. L. Kreigh-lyen, H. O. Greenwood, John Greenwood, P. S. Greenwood, all of Seattle. She was a aunt of Charles W. N. L. Guy, of Dallas.

The body, which has been lying in state at the Herald & Times chapel, was shipped Friday to Seattle where funeral services will be held Sunday.
