

ROCK CRUSHER CAUSES DELAY IN ROAD WORK

POLICY CHANGE IS ADOPTED AT CHURCH SESSION

Newberg—Two outstanding changes have marked the 38th annual session of Oregon yearly meeting which closed Sunday evening. One is the appointment of a superintendent, which the yearly meeting has not had for several years, Chester A. Hadley being chosen for this position, which will make necessary the selection of another pastor by the First Friends church of Portland; and the other is the change of policy by the foreign mission board, and the adoption of a separate field for Oregon, to be completely under the control of this yearly meeting. This new field is in Bolivia.

The first of these two important actions was taken without a dissenting voice; but a very strong minority objected to the last to the abandonment of the work in Africa, which Oregon has been helping to support for more than thirty years. A proposal to allow each meeting and each member to send his support where he desired, leaving the Bolivian mission under the management of the California board was not favored, and the minority were only allowed to make contributions to other than the yearly meeting fields if they desired, but were not permitted to send their funds through the yearly meeting treasury.

Carroll Tamplin and wife of Portland, were accepted as the first missionaries to go to this new Bolivian field. They have been for four years in the Central American work.

Education occupied the attention of the yearly meeting Saturday afternoon, with reports from Pacific college and from Greenleaf academy, the quarterly meeting school in Idaho. The Pacific college reports showed a successful year, with the largest freshman class in its history.

The reports from the departments of home missions and social service and the Christian Endeavor union showed unusual activity along these lines.

Many were absent from the Saturday morning session of the yearly meeting on account of the funeral of Frank A. Elliott, a member of the meeting and husband of Marguerite P. Elliott, for 25 years recording clerk. Some of these had been appointed as a special committee to represent the yearly meeting officially.
