

SCHOOL BOARD CHANGES MADE THRU DISTRICT

Amity—Amity had one of the largest attendances in recent years at its annual school meeting Monday. An entire new board of directors was elected. John Lorenzen, who had moved from the district, S. E. Howard, resigned, and W. R. Osborne, term expired, composed the old board. L. C. Sherwood, W. E. Yarnes and M. T. Henderson are the new board members elected. Guy Nott was re-elected clerk.

Lyons—The annual school meeting was held at the school house Monday evening. Mrs. Ruth Lyons was elected director for a term of three years to take Mrs. Alex Bodiker's place. Mrs. Roy Huber was re-elected clerk for one year.

Eola—The annual school election was held Monday resulting in L. A. Ferguson being the unanimous choice for director, and Henry Carr, clerk. Robert Brown was awarded the contract for the school wood.

Scotts Mills—The annual school election was called Monday evening at 7 o'clock at the school building with a medium crowd attending. The budget for the coming year carried with a large majority.
