The Monitor lodge was in charge of the burial services.

Surviving him are his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Lulu Howell, who resides near the Fleegle home.

Pioneer Steamboatmen of Northwest Gather Sunday For Reunion at Champoege

Champoege—Veteran steamboatmen, their families, descendants and friends, estimated at 5000 in number, relived pioneer times on the Willamette and Columbia rivers at the fifth annual reunion of the association here Sunday.

Allegiance and loyalty to the flag was stressed by Dr. P. O. Riley of Hubbard, who gave the dedicatory address for a new flag donated by the Columbia Valley association. Music for the ceremony and the remainder of the program was given by the Hubbard community band and the Salem Kiltie band. Judge Fred Wilson, an old-time mid-Columbia punner, served as master of ceremonies for the third consecutive year, and introduced Governor A. W. Norblad, of Salem, who spoke briefly on the evolution of water transportation from before the Christian era to the 19th century and on to the present.

Early days at Lewiston and river traffic on the Snake river were recalled by Captain J. E. Alkin. He was followed by Harry Baughman, Portland attorney and son of a pioneer riverman. Charles Jennings, aged mariner, engineer of San Diego, who comes each year for the reunion, spoke in the Chinook Indian tongue.

Features of the program included the releasing of 25 homing pigeons with messages for some of the veterans in and near Portland who were unable to attend the reunion and the presentation of silver cups to both musical organizations. Special tribute was paid the memory of the dead steamboat and rivermen with the "Beaver", moored at the landing site, giving three blasts of the marine salute. The "Beaver" brought a large crowd to the park from Portland.
