

TURNER IS HOST TO CHRISTIAN CONVENTION

ANNUAL AFFAIR DRAWS CROWDS TO TABERNACLE

Turner—The 29th annual state Christian convention opened Saturday evening in the tabernacle at Turner with the evening devotion led by Carman E. Meil of Medford, and the opening sermon delivered by Rev. E. J. Gilstrap, pastor of the Turner Christian church.

Sunday was a record attendance day for the first day of the convention with nearly 700 people registered by evening. Sunday morning was devoted to Bible school and the morning worship, with the guest speaker, George A. Miller of Omaha, Neb., delivering the sermon. The afternoon services drew large crowds, with the convention song leader and musician, Carman E. Meil of Medford leading the song service. The communion sermon was delivered by V. E. Hoven of Eugene, and at 3:30 o'clock the Lord's supper was partaken of by the multitude of people. Sunday evening was the Christian Endeavor prayer meeting, followed by the evening devotion and sermon. Monday's topic for the day was "Ministry," and all services and classes were well attended.

Tuesday afternoon will be the state board session, and in the evening the stereoscopic pictures concerning the Washington, D. C. convention will be shown by Rev. D. J. Howe of Salem. Wednesday is the annual "Women's Missionary Society" day, with reports by various committees. Arrangements are being made by the women of the Turner Christian church to serve the annual banquet Wednesday evening at 5:30 o'clock in the church dining room for members and friends of the state missionary societies. Plans are being made to serve 150 guests or more at the banquet. A missionary address, installation of officers and other interesting messages will be features of Wednesday afternoon's program. A record attendance is looked for this year at the tabernacle, more are arriving daily to the camp grounds. Washington, California, Oregon and other states are well represented at the annual convention this year.

A dog which had been a constant companion of Peter Kline was also missing. Several times previous when Kline went to the neighbors the dog had been shut up but when let out would immediately hunt up his master. The dog was missing Wednesday night but returned to the cabin Thursday morning. It now lives at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Kline and seems to pay no attention to its master's cabin. Kline's gun was at the cabin and his money which might indicate that he had neither gone hunting or gone to town. His good clothes were also at the cabin.
