

NORMAL SCHOOL WOMAN KILLED MONDAY

HEAD INJURIES ARE FATAL FOR MRS. ADA GRIMES

Mounmouth—Knocked down by an automobile at Main and Mounmouth avenues, Mrs. Ada Grimes 47, of Prineville, summer school student at the Oregon normal school, died within a few minutes after being hit shortly before 6 o'clock Monday afternoon. Lyle Wayne Klein, 20, of Corvallis, also a student and athletic star for the last two years, was the driver of the machine.

Mrs. Grimes with her daughter, Edna, was crossing the street as young Klein came around the corner. He applied the brakes and almost stopped, starting forward when Mrs. Grimes stepped to one side. She became confused and turned back into the path of the machine. The fall to the curb was sufficient to fracture her skull, Coroner W. C. Hinkle, of Ulaas, was called and after investigating said an inquest would not be necessary. Miss Grimes holds Klein blameless for the accident, as it was her warning cry to her mother that confused the elder woman.

The remains are at the Walter L. Smith mortuary with funeral arrangements to be held at Prineville, though details are not yet complete. Edna Grimes is the only surviving member of the immediate family. Mrs. Grimes and daughter had just returned from Prineville where they spent the week-end. Both taught school at Moro, in Sherman county.

Hubbard—L. Dreher, well known Hubbard landscape gardener, was injured in an automobile accident early Monday morning. At a Salem hospital where he was taken, 40 stitches were taken in one of his arms and shoulder. Other injuries consisted of a broken nose, foot and leg and severe bruises.

The accident happened as he was crossing the highway to go to the Frank Fish dairy for his daily supply of milk. In trying to avoid two cars he was struck by a third coming from another direction. Two of the cars were owned by H. J. Lovejoy of Chehalis, Wash., and H. D. Johnson of Hoquiam, Wash. The name of the owner of the third car was not ascertained.

The drivers of the car gave first aid to Dreher, bringing him to his home a block away and getting Dr. Gerald Smith of Woodburn. Mrs. Dreher, who is a nurse, accompanied her husband to Salem and remained with him during the operative aid given him there. She reported that his injuries were severe and that recovery might be slow on that account and also on account of his age as he is past middle life.

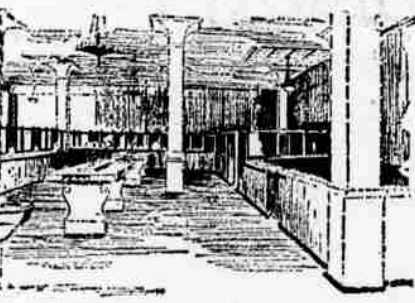
