TENURE LAWS DISCUSSED AT N. E. A. SESSION

Columbus, O. (AP)—With the presentation of committee reports on tenure laws and retirement systems for school teachers the National Education association swung into the first business session of its 68th annual convention Tuesday.

Reports of committees of tenure and retirement allowances, through which the association hopes to build up a more efficient body of teachers for public schools were outstanding among committee studies offered at the initial session of the representative assembly.

Nominations for president to succeed E. Ruth Pyrie, of Lincoln, Neb., were in order. Three outstanding educators mentioned for the presidency are Joseph Roster, Fairmount, W. Va., president of the West Virginia state normal school; Willis A. Sutton, superintendent of schools at Atlanta, Ga., and Dr. John W. Abernethy, Montgomery, Ala., assistant superintendent of education in Alabama.

An elaborate speaking program for the association's general sessions was centered Tuesday upon the international point of view as a vital value in education, one of the themes of this year's meeting. The question as it affects the Philippine islands, was the topic cited by Camillo O'Neil, resident commissioner of the Philippines.

JUNE PROVED COOL, MOIST

While June appeared a moist month, it was cool and the rainfall .43 inches less than the general average for the month which is 1.42 inches, a study of weather figures for the month reveals. The precipitation for the month just passed was .99 inches. Rain fell on nine of the 30 days, occurring on the first five consecutive days of the month, the 7th, 20th, 26th and 28th. The greatest amount was .44 inches, reported for June 4 with .14 inches June 3 and .13 inches June 28.

Seasons have alternated "wet" and "dry" for the last few years, the official weather bureau records show. June last year had 1.29 inches with .85 in 1928 and 1.54 in 1927 as compared with .54 inches in 1926 and .96 inches in 1925. Only one June on record was absolutely without rainfall. This was in 1918. June of 1922 brought only .03 inches. Sixteen Junes since the establishment of the bureau have brought less rainfall than the month just passed with June 1913, when the precipitation was .34 inches and June, 1904, with .35 inches, setting the low moisture marks.

SCHOOL REPORTS BY GILL MISSING

Dissatisfaction with Eugene L. Gill, member of the physical education staff at Salem high school, is finding grounds for expression in Gill's mislaying a number of physical examination reports of high school boys in Gill's department made by Dr. Edward Lee Russell, school physician. The loss of these reports has prevented Dr. Russell from completing his annual report to the city school system and the Marion county health unit.

Superintendent George Hug sent to Corvallis Monday to see Gill, who is attending summer school there, and question him about the records. Gill stated they were in his office in the high school building. When the office was examined Tuesday morning by Hug and Principal Fred Wolf no trace of the records was found.

Gill's application to teach in the high school for the coming year was tabled at a recent school board meeting, and to date no action has been taken on it. It is known that Principal Wolf complained in his annual report to Hug of Gill's unsatisfactory work. Some of Wolf's trouble with Gill is supposed to be over the secret society question. "Luke" Gill is a graduate of Salem high school and while attending the school was known to be a member of organizations now forbidden; and it is alleged that his sympathies in the fuss over secret societies during the spring term, were with the societies group.

Frank T. Wriggins is displaying a 40-year jewel that was presented to him at a recent meeting of Chemeketa lodge No. 1, Independent Order of Odd Fellows. This jewel, indicating that he has been a member of the lodge for forty years, is of costly make, is engraved with the recipient's name and in design is emblematic of the order.

Roy Simers, in charge of the municipal incinerator is looking for a truck driver who drove up to the plant on a Sunday and dumped a load of tin cans and rubbish in front of the gate. Simers found it necessary to hire a truck and move the stuff before the gate could be opened. The incinerator is not open on Sunday but somebody is at the plant from about 8 o'clock every work day morning until 5 o'clock in the evening. On another occasion the attendants found that three large barrels filled with cans had been left at the gate some time between 7 p. m. and 6 o'clock in the morning. Simers states that if it is absolutely necessary for persons to drive out to the plant after hours, he will make arrangements to have an attendant there if he is notified.

SEEK TO BUY POWER PLANT FROM EUGENE

Eugene (AP)—In a statement made public here Tuesday afternoon by the Eugene water board, it was declared that a movement is under way to sell to private interests the municipally owned Eugene power plant while stating that no definite proposal had been made, the water board indicated that a group of eastern capitalists is interested in the proposed deal.

Purchase of the Eugene plant would involve an election. There are reports that an effort will be made to put the proposition on the ballot in November.

E. J. Adams, formerly of Eugene and now in Washington, D. C., is said to have been in touch with the eastern capitalists interested in buying the Eugene plant. The water board statement said that Adams had written a Eugene business man asking for information as to the financial condition of the utilities here.

According to the water board statement, the capitalists at first were apparently interested in both the power and water departments, but that later they apparently had not decided to include the water department in the negotiations.

OCEAN FLIERS TO START WEST

Roosevelt Field, N. Y. (AP)—Major Charles E. Kingsford-Smith Tuesday announced tentative plans to leave in his monoplane Southern Cross at 7 a. m. Wednesday for Chicago.

He arrived at the field shortly before noon to inspect the Southern Cross in which he and three companions flew from Ireland to New York with a stop at Harbor Grace, Newfoundland.

From Chicago, Kingsford-Smith will fly to California.

5 CENTS OFFERED FOR ROYAL ANNES

Max Gehlhar, who has been doing some Royal Anne barreling in his prime drier in West Salem in connection with the association operations, announced Tuesday that the barreling proposition for maraschino purposes there has taken on a much bigger aspect and he will take all the cherries he can possibly handle at a five cent basis, orchard run. This means no docking for culls.

He expects to handle at least 10 cars of barreled cherries on this basis. He stated if the deal could have been put over a little sooner probably 30 or 40 cars would have been handled but as it is he is afraid he can't get the equipment on hand to handle such a big proposition but will take care of all the cherries it is possible to under the conditions. The five cent cannery price has also been on a basis of docking for culls.

LOCAL SPORTSMEN AFTER GIFFORD

Charging inefficiency and failure to cooperate with game protective organizations of the state a resolution condemning Harold Gifford, and asking his resignation will be considered by members of the Marion County Game Protective association at a meeting Tuesday night at 8 o'clock in the chamber of commerce rooms.

"We are simply backing up other organizations of the state in their effort to oust Gifford," Chris Kovita, secretary of the local association stated Tuesday. "While I am familiar with the nature of the charges which will be filed with the state game commission at its next meeting, July 15, I am not in a position to make them public."

MRS. MOTT WINS CONTEST OVER OLD JUDGEMENT

A supreme court opinion Tuesday, written by Justice McBride and affirming Judge J. U. Campbell, who sat in the circuit court for Marion county, upholds the contents of Willetta May Mott, widow of the late Dr. W. S. Mott of Salem, in a case against her and the Cobbs-Mitchell company as appellant and the Salem Brick & Tile company as co-defendants.

The Cobbs-Mitchell company in 1915 recovered a judgment against W. S. Mott for \$83.89, which has not been paid. In June, 1919, a decree was entered in favor of the Oregon Holding company for closing a mortgage executed by Dr. and Mrs. Mott upon certain property in Marion, Polk and Harney counties, and directing the sale of the tract mentioned to satisfy the mortgage. A judgment lien of the Falls City-Salem Lumber company was adjudged to be prior to the mortgage lien of the Oregon Holding company as to the property, and it was decided that out of the proceeds of the sale the money should first be applied to payment of the lumber company's mortgage lien, and the remainder to the amount due on the mortgage of the Oregon Holding company.

Among the tracts which the decree ordered sold was the Mott real estate in Salem. This sale took place after Dr. Mott's death and enough was realized to pay in full the claim of the Oregon Holding company and the judgment lien of the Falls City-Salem Lumber company, leaving a balance of over \$3000 upon which Mrs. Mott filed a claim of homestead on the surplus proceeds which the sheriff had turned over to Mrs. Mott. The Cobbs-Mitchell company and co-defendants issued execution on their judgments and garnished the money in the hands of the clerk, claiming the right to have it applied to satisfaction of their judgments.

The complaint alleged that the circuit court, following the issuance of the execution, and without notice to the plaintiffs, made an order directing the clerk to turn the money over to Mrs. Mott. They alleged that the clerk will do so unless restrained. If it is done they claim they will be unable to collect judgment.

The Cobbs-Mitchell company then obtained an order from the county judge enjoining Circuit Judge McMahon and Attorney James Mott from making further motions or orders in the matter, and County Clerk Boyer from paying over the money to Mrs. Mott.

"Subsequently," says the supreme court opinion, "it probably appeared to the county judge that it was somewhat a novel procedure for the county judge to enjoin the circuit judge from making orders in his own court, the order was amended by striking out the name of Judge McMahon, wherever it occurred in the original order, and the defendants appearing by demurrer to the complaint, the case was heard before Judge J. U. Campbell." Judge Campbell sustained Mrs. Mott and dissolved the injunction.

The opinion holds that Judge McMahon's order that the clerk turn the money to Mrs. Mott was valid, and that the clerk Boyer was justified in turning over the money after dissolution of the injunction by Judge Campbell.

CHICAGO VOTES ON TRACTION MERGER

Chicago (AP)—Citizens of Chicago voted Tuesday on a proposition to unite all the city's transportation systems into one concern directed by the Samuel Insull interests.

Proponents based their campaign upon claims that passage of the ordinance would alleviate unemployment and provide the city with adequate transportation, subway included, for the millions of persons expected here for the world's fair in 1933.

Opponents argued that the promise to expend \$200,000,000 for expansions was merely "a promise" and that no provision was made by the ordinance as to when the subway or other improvements must be started.

TO SPEND \$200,000 IN NATIONAL FORESTS

Portland (AP)—Major John Guthrie, assistant regional forester, said Tuesday, \$200,000 will be spent in improving the forest equipment and protection facilities of the 22 national forests of the Pacific northwest.

Mount Hood national forest leads with an allotment of \$10,000 made by J. C. Buck, regional forester.

Washington (AP)—President Hoover has decided to call the senate into special session for consideration of the London naval treaty next Monday, if congress adjourns this week.

Congressional leaders were making a drive Tuesday to secure an adjournment by Thursday night to permit a holiday over the fourth of July.

Allie Worrell of Albany had both legs broken Tuesday afternoon when she was struck by an automobile driven by I. Estelle of Falls City, according to an accident report filed with the police.

The Estelle woman says she was backing from the curb in front of Miller's store and saw what she thought was the back of another automobile. The Worrell woman was not seen at any time by the driver of the car, she states, until after the accident. Salem hospitals had no record of a woman being brought to their institutions with broken legs.

BANKS TO SEEK M'NARY'S BIRTH

Medford (AP)—Lewellyn A. Banks, publisher of the Medford Daily News, and prominent fruit grower of the Rogue river valley, announced Tuesday that "Because at no time in recent years has Oregon needed a fearless and energetic senator in Washington as at this present time," he has definitely decided to run for election to the United States senate as an independent in the November election.

A convention has been called for July 8, at Medford, at which it is expected that Banks will be nominated on an independent ticket in accord with the state law.

Banks' platform is primarily repeal of the farm marketing act and repeal of the 18th amendment.

Obituary

J. P. READ

Telegraphic advices were received Tuesday by Miss Grace Pawk of the death at Burlingame, Calif., of J. P. Read, 43 years, former Salem boy, and well known here, particularly in banking circles. Death was very sudden and no details concerning it were received in the telegram.

J. P. Read was brought up in Salem, graduated from the Capital Business college with honors, and took employment with the old Capital National bank. After working there for some time he went into the state banking department under the student Sargent and when the Sargent went with the federal reserve with headquarters at San Francisco he took Mr. Read with him. Read later became a federal reserve bank examiner which position he held until the time of his death.

He married Miss Gertrude Fawc of Salem, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Fawc. Mr. Fawc and daughter Grace, just returned from Burlingame recently where they had been visiting the Read family. The Reads left on their vacation with the return of the Fawcs to Salem and had just completed it and returned to Burlingame when Mr. Read's death occurred.

No word has yet been received as to funeral arrangements. Mr. Read's father and mother, Salem people, both died a number of years ago.

MRS. SARAH BROWN

Mrs. Sarah Brown of Mill City died Tuesday morning from smallpox, according to a report brought back to Salem Tuesday afternoon by Dr. Vernon Douglas, county health officer. This is the first death from smallpox reported here since 1926. Although Mrs. Brown lived in the Linn county side of Mill City, the Marion county health officials were asked to work on the case.

The woman had been ill for the past two weeks, and a number of contacts were made because the disease was not recognized. Her husband and one other person are now mildly ill with smallpox. Her two children were both vaccinated and are protected. All known contacts are being followed and vaccinated. The source of the disease is not known.

It is not anticipated by Dr. Douglas that an epidemic of smallpox will start in Mill City because a number of people living there had the disease during an epidemic several years ago. Since then most of the children in the community have been vaccinated. A warning has been issued to all children and adults in that vicinity who have not been vaccinated to secure protection.

J. L. CALVERT

Hubbard—J. L. Calvert, republican precinct committeeman at Hubbard, died Tuesday morning at 11:30 following an illness of 4 or 5 days from heart trouble. He was exceptionally well known here. He and his family have been residents of Hubbard for more than 20 years.

Mr. Calvert is survived by his widow and three children; Ruth, a cashier in the Hubbard bank and town treasurer; Eldon in Chicago and Percy, stationed near Medford. He was past 70 years. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

A force of men is demolishing the old line department building of the Portland Electric power company on Liberty street near the new bridge. With the occupation of the new building at Liberty and Division streets the line department was transferred to that structure. The old building that is being torn down was of frame construction and covered a space 40x20 feet. The steam plant and switching station which was situated by the old line department building will be left intact. Removal of the old frame structure will materially improve the appearance of the property.

\$99,045 FROM FOREST FUNDS TO FIGHT FIRE

State Forester Lynn F. Cronemiller was informed Tuesday by the United States forest service that the federal Clarke-McNary allotment to the state for the fiscal year beginning Tuesday is \$99,045. This fund is paid to the state in recognition of federal responsibility in the protection of state and privately owned timber lands from fire.

Cronemiller stands near the top. Cronemiller said in the amount of federal funds allotted to the state for the reason that the forestry system in Oregon most nearly complies with the objects of the Clarke-McNary act.

The allotment is on the basis of state expenditures on a fifty-fifty basis. The allotments to the various fire patrol associations in the state are:
