

MOLALLA POPULATION INCREASES OVER HOLIDAYS

CENSUS TAKER SHOULD VISIT DURING RODEO

Molalla—The population of Molalla has doubled the last few days with the coming of cowboys and cowgirls, carnival people and stock wranglers and the activity of the community at large in getting ready for the opening of the seventh annual Buckaroo to be held July 4, 5 and 6.

There are four carloads of stock and twenty-five longhorn bulldozing steers from Chihuahua, Mexico, on the grounds. These steers are the best to ever be used at the Buckaroo. Many horses are coming in from the hills to take part in the racing events and in the parade.

Chub Morgan, who has thrilled audiences in some of the largest shows in America including Chicago, Los Angeles and New York by bull-dogging a steer from the running board of a car had a tryout at the arena Tuesday night and made the record of 7 1/2 seconds.

Champions and near champions will take part in the contests. Walter Bonifer, winner of second place in the northwest championship last year, is here. Gus Beeks, a rancher and a cowboy who loves sports, a college boy and favorite of the grandstands is here again.

The Indians from the Simnasho reservation with Chief Two Whistles have pitched their tepees on the main street near the Buckaroo grounds. They have some of the best regalia of any tribe and will be seen in the parades, arena show and night show in their native dress and war paint.

The Estomado band is the official band of the show and will be dressed in cowboy outfits and add color to the show. Saturday will be children's day and the 55 piece juvenile band of Portland will be given them by the Civic club at the city park.

Cotton Bells, Gangster, Sudden, Vagabond, Al Capone, Light Burt, Fire Ball, Search Light, Beacon, and Bronco Seltzer are some of the names of the bucking horses to be used in the contests.

Among the guests of honor at the show will be Governor and Mrs. A. W. Norblad, Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss and Mrs. Hoss. The night show will be an attraction with the parades, circus and acrobatic acts, Indians and fireworks. The association are giving dances and carnival fun each night.

Hubbard—Joseph L. Calvert, well known Hubbard pioneer business man, died Tuesday noon after a week's illness with heart trouble. The funeral arrangements are pending the communications from one of his sons in Chicago.

Surviving Mr. Calvert are Mrs. Calvert, two sons, E. M. of Chicago, Ill., and P. L. Calvert of Walla Walla; one daughter, Ruth Calvert, cashier in the Hubbard State bank; one stepdaughter, Mrs. Edna C. Hovenden of Seaside, and one grand daughter, Janet of Walla Walla.

Other near relatives surviving are six half-sisters, Mrs. Madge Woolery, Mrs. Nellie Woolery, Salem; Mrs. Clara Dimick, Woodburn; Mrs. Dora Forbis, Medford; Mrs. Mary Palmer, Hubbard; and Mrs. Laura James of Molalla.

Calvert was unusually well known throughout all of the valley towns, as he was the son of early Oregon pioneers, having been born September 10, 1855. His early years were spent in Gervais where he grew to young manhood and where he became a member of the Masonic order. He enjoyed membership with this organization for the past 50 years.

In 1880 he opened a drug store in Hubbard and from then on was closely associated with the social and political life of the community. On May 10, 1883 he was married to Elvie James Curtis.

He retired from the drug business in 1908 and became interested in the Hubbard State bank, serving five years as cashier of this institution. After severing his connections as cashier he became a contractor in cement work and continued this work until recently.

Calvert was a patron of music in all its forms. Whenever the schools gave programs, when the band gave concerts, he was found in the audience, always interested and appreciative. His criticism in band work was keen and unusually constructive.
