

UNION CHURCH SERMONS WILL BE IN ORDER

Dallas—Rev. J. W. Warrel is back from the annual conference held at Astoria. The sermon, "The Church Looking Forward," to be given Sunday morning is the result of observations made during the conference.

A patriotic message will be delivered by Rev. Warrel at the evening service which marks the opening of the union meetings scheduled to be held throughout the city in July and August.
