

LOGGING MAN MANGLED UNDER ENGINE WHEELS

LAWRENCE HAS SUDDEN DEATH SUNDAY NIGHT

Silverton—James Lawrence, a filer in one of the Silver Falls Lumber company's camps, was instantly killed here Sunday night when he fell under the wheels of a company truck just as it was preparing to leave the local round house for camp.

Lawrence climbed onto the engine just as it was leaving the round house and just before a coupling was made onto some oil cars. He was unaware that the coupling was about to be made and the impact which followed knocked him loose from the engine, throwing him underneath. His body was badly mangled. A fellow employee tried to warn Lawrence of his danger but the latter failed to hear him.

Lawrence, who was well thought of by fellow employees and lived near Scotts Mills, leaves a widow, Fay Shepherd Lawrence, and a small son.

ORGANIST OCCUPIED WITH MODERN CAMP

Woodburn—Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Hawley, Jr., recently of Portland, have purchased the five acre one mile south of Woodburn on the Pacific highway, formerly owned by Tom Buckett, including the restaurant known as Tom's Electric Cafe, and the service station. Mr. and Mrs. Hawley have changed the name to "Chic Inn," and are making extensive improvements. They expect later to erect cottages and to conduct a modern auto camp.

Mr. and Mrs. Hawley are well known in Salem, where Hawley occupied the position of pipe organ player at the Oregon theater eleven years ago for seven or eight years. His first organ concert in Salem tied up traffic, so great was the attendance and it was necessary to repeat the concert. In 1923 the Hawleys left Salem for Los Angeles, where he was organist at Grauman's million dollar theater. He was later called to Chicago by Balala and Katz and gave his entire time to opening their new theaters with concerts. Returning to Portland he went into the music business.

The Hawleys have an 11-year old daughter, Nellie Jane, who formerly was a pupil of the White dancing school in Salem. Mrs. Hawley is a member of Chadwick chapter No. 37, O. E. S. of Salem and Hawley is a charter member of the El Kanar Grotto and is the composer of their official song. At present he is driving to Portland four nights a week, where he is chief organist at the Oaks park. It is the intention of the Hawleys to apply their varied experience in other lines to the business of catering to the public, and to give the people a place of recreation of a different class than the usual highway eating house.
