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## George is Only 13 Years But Weighs 350 Pounds; Sullen Since Mate Taken

Hubbard.—Old George, the venerable ostrich at Ames Auto park on the Pacific highway just north of Hubbard, is alone. His mate who laid \$1 eggs died some months ago and George stalks about his pen sullenly. Only when visitors enter does he enjoy himself. Then he spreads all of his feathers, stalks to and fro, flaps his wings, kneels in the sand and preens his tips. Donald Norton, the young man in charge of the animals at the zoo says "He's just showing off!" George is now 13 years old and weighs 350 pounds.

Another lonely old fellow is hen pecked Steve whose wife refused to let him eat from their common eating pan. Old Steve got so thin and morose that Donald put his wife Micky in a separate cage.

The trouble started six weeks ago when Steve, the monk, gave his wife a beating. The fight was so fierce that Donald had to get a pole to pry the combatants apart. Micky whimpered and tried to make up with Steve but he was mean to her.

Then she turned like a woman scorned and beat Steve after which she began to starve him. The keepers noticed that something was wrong and watched the cage. After that they were put into separate apartments.

Other interesting animals there are "Tuck" the coyote who is really a pet of the keepers. He was brought from Wyoming when he was but a wee cub and kindly care has made him very lovable. Susie, a monkey of five years, came from Java and so far her heart has not been touched. She lives in a nest compartment all alone but seemingly very content.

There are five glossy racoons, a pair of woodchuck, a light gray striped badger with light large markings; four pure white Japanese "silksies" who had three eggs in their nest in one corner; a huge chinchilla rabbit, a golden pheasant, a hooot owl which refused to open its eyes.

In one pen was a male "turkin" which is a cross between a turkey and Rhode Island Red chicken. He was most ugly with a long scrawny blooded neck, a short stumpy body covered with the Rhode Island plumage and heavy strong feet and legs. In the same pen with him were three Muscovy ducks which are said to be a quackless variety but the rasping noises they made as the keeper fed them were fully as monotonous as the usual quack song.

In a separate cage were five young turkeys all half grown. The fowl ever raised domestically. The turkin is said to be the most edible meat has a game flavor but is more delicate.

Then there was the two-year-old pet, "Pritzy" the coast deer, and "Rinty" the Algerian wolf hound which is kept caged until he is sold and he is too large to roam around. Donald explained that a good hound was wanted for him and that he might be had for a very moderate price. He is a beauty but stands high and needs a large range to be at liberty.

"Old Joe" the first bear ever kept by the park was caged with Betty, a one and a half year old bear who seemed really fond of the old fellow. Two ferrets, mates for two years, were still amiable and would hardly do more than look up from their petting when addressed by the caretaker.

"Spittie", the bobcat, is too mean for anything and a double grating protects those who visit the cage. He weighs at least 30 pounds and is always ready to pick a quarrel.

The zoo is situated on five acres of ground, all of which except two acres is virgin forest land. On the cleared land are the zoo, service station, the wash houses with showers and 10 cottages for tourists. There is electricity in every cabin, a stove and other necessities for camping. Water is piped from a 135 foot well and it is ice cold.

The Ames Auto park was planned and built by H. Ames, who deceased. At present it is under the management of Mrs. L. M. Looey, then Mrs. Ames, and her son, Donald Norton. The pens are clean, well strawed, with fresh water in each pen. The animals are well fed with a variety of foods such as bread, meat, grass, grain, fruits, vegetables and prepared meals.

**MOUNT VESUVIUS IN MIDST OF ACTIVITY**

Naples, Italy (UP)—Mount Vesuvius was in the midst of its customary spring activity Tuesday.

Large quantities of lava poured from the eruptive cone through a rent 39 metres (98 feet) wide, while lava also was flowing from three other sources and the side cone.

The eastern section of the crater already was filled with lava. Professor Malladra, director of the Vesuvius observatory, said the eruption, which began Monday later than usual for its spring activity, was likely to last several weeks.
