Dallas—Confinement is having little or no effect on the Dale Lawson youthful self-confessed slayer of Mrs. Dickinson at Independence.

Since he became an inmate of the county jail he has only once been outside its walls and that for the sole purpose of having his hair cut. Sticking close to his quarters has not, to all intents and purposes affected him at all. His appetite has not been impaired nor his health injured.

A great deal of his time is spent reading, not trashy stuff, but text books relating directly to telegraphy. He also receives numerous letters from a telegrapher in eastern Oregon and authorities believe that had this tragedy not occurred that this would have been his vocation in life.

A Portland newspaper claims his attention just as soon as it arrives. Should it fail to do so, Dale wants to know why. As was to be expected the Douglas case in Washington excited his special interest but drew no comment from him whatsoever.

His father, seeking to alleviate the loneliness which must at times get the better of his boy, has thoughtfully provided a radio for him and has furnished entertainment for the other prisoners at the same time.
