

HEAD OF GEER TRIBE CALLED IN CALIFORNIA

Waldo Hills—Word was received here Saturday of the death of Calvin Geer in San Francisco on July 11. Geer was one of Oregon's oldest living pioneers and one of the best known.

Geer came to Oregon with his family over the Barlow road. He was the last remaining member of the emigrant train that first crossed the Barlow road in 1847. He had often spoken of the hardships of that time. For years Mr. Geer lived in the Waldo Hills but for the past few years he has spent his winters at Yuma, Arizona with his daughter, Mrs. Ida Clymer. Until this summer he has returned each year for the Geer reunion. This summer he came as far as San Francisco and his children thought that it would be best for him not to come any further. He stayed there for a brief visit with his son, Irvin Geer, and it was while he was there that he took sick and died. The letter bringing the news to Silverton reports that his illness was of short duration.

Geer would have been 94 had he lived until next October. He is survived by five children. Hal Geer of Tacoma, Port Geer of New York, Mrs. Mary Brown of Burns, Mrs. Ida Clymer of Yuma, and Irvin Geer of San Francisco. Geer was a brother of Mrs. Timothy Davenport, the mother of the noted Homer Calvin Davenport, cartoonist, and a cousin of Theodore T. Geer, one of Oregon's early governors.

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FIRE DISTRICT PLAN ATTRACTS FEW TO TURNER

Turner—The meeting held in the high school auditorium Saturday evening to discuss the forming of a fire district for the community was poorly attended due to the fact that many are busy taking care of hay which has come on rapidly the past few hot days and also that a grange meeting was scheduled for the same night.

Some headway was made and initial plans to present the proposition to the residents within the five mile radius of Turner. Booklets which explain the plan of organizing a fire district and which are written in a non-technical, readily understandable manner, are to be mailed to all those who should be interested. A letter of explanation and asking serious consideration of the matter will be included with the literature.

George W. Stokes and E. A. Taylor, deputy state fire marshals were present and Stokes gave a talk explaining features of the plan. S. P. Wright a representative of a fire equipment company also spoke on several phases of the plan and gave valuable suggestions towards getting it started.

While the attendance was small several were enthusiastic and it is hoped they will form the nucleus that will eventually obtain the consent of a sufficient number to declare the district, and to acquire the necessary fire fighting apparatus. Later a petition will be circulated within the district boundary for the signatures of those who favor the district, the petition to be filed with the county court who will appoint a board of supervisors who will make the arrangements for the purchase of the equipment.
