

# WOODBURN COUNCILMEN SEEK TO ABOLISH LIGHTS

## ILLUMINATION SURVEY GIVEN EARLY START

Woodburn—W. M. Hamilton and J. A. Brownson of the Pacific Northwest Service company were present upon invitation of the Woodburn city council at their regular meeting Tuesday night and a discussion of the abolishment of certain street lights and the installation of new ones occupied the greater part of the evening.

It is the desire of the city to abolish two lights on Ogle street for the reason that this street is now practically impassable and not used to any extent, the traffic having been diverted to South Front street, on the opposite side of the railroad. It is also necessary that new lights be installed on South Front street.

Many questions were asked by the council and city attorney, some of which were answered as to rates, cost of installation and the right to abolish existing lights. It was conceded by Hamilton that conditions make the abolishment of Ogle street lights desirable and no objection was made to this but there was some disagreement as to the cost of installing other lights. However, it was agreed that the council make a survey of the city and report to the light company just what lights should be discontinued throughout the city and where others may be needed and it is probable that some agreement will be reached which will be satisfactory to both the city and the power company.

On motion the recorder was instructed to order a book of automobile registrations.

The fire board was instructed to investigate the cost of a paid fireman to be kept on duty at all times for the care of the new fire truck and to see what arrangements can be made in this regard. A report was made by Councilman Evenden of the test made of the fire truck at the Molalla river, which proved very satisfactory, and the mayor and recorder were authorized to sign the acceptance and complete the contract for the purchase of the equipment as soon as a written report is received by the underwriters.

The street commissioner was instructed to notify J. F. Werthum to cut the grass on his property on Grant street, between Fourth and Fifth streets.

The recorder was instructed to advertise for ten cords of old second growth wood for use of the city, and was also authorized to purchase paint for the city hall, which he offered to apply.

A complaint was made by G. Baillo of a shortage of water, caused by the blowing out of mains at the Woodburn auto park and the street commissioner was ordered to notify the owners of the auto park that this should not be done, unless under the direction of the water superintendent.

Reports of city officers were accepted and filed.

## TURKEY FARMER NEAR ST. PAUL HAS BIG CROP

Coyle keeps Mammouth Bronze turkeys exclusively, which are housed and raised after improved methods on hardwoods, a type of wire netting that keeps both birds and houses clean. The new brooders, recently completed, are heated by a hot water system.

Coyle has 1250 turkeys out on range which are three months old and 500 ready to go out which are about three weeks old.

Breeding stock is raised as well as market birds and eggs and poultry, day-old or desired age, will soon be obtainable.

Alphin, who is in his 80th year, were presented with gifts.
