

BILYEU RITES IMPRESSIVE AT FAMILY PLACE

Scio—One of the largest funerals in recent years in Scio was that of Mrs. George M. Bilyeu, 64, who passed away at 6:30 Friday evening, July 11, at the family home in Scio. Mrs. Bilyeu had been rapidly failing following an auto accident in Portland on the afternoon of Easter Sunday, April 20 this year.

Melba Nail was born in Indiana November 4, 1863. Her mother died when Melba was two years of age, and the father, sons and daughters came to Oregon in 1869. For a time they made their home at and in the vicinity of Portland but later came to the Jefferson locality, where Melba attended school.

On November 20, 1881, she was united in marriage to George M. Bilyeu and to this union four sons and four daughters were born, all of whom ministered to the suffering mother's condition during the last days of her life. She spent all of her adult life in Scio and vicinity. Her passing marked the first broken link in the long chain of nearly 40 years in the family history.

In addition to the husband, other surviving members of the immediate family are: Mrs. Effie Small, Portland; Ed Bilyeu of Scio; Lester of Cut Bank, Mont.; Mrs. Ada Krume, Albany; Mrs. Amy Thomas, Albany; G. D. Bilyeu, Silverton; Mrs. Jessie Klinge, Scio; and Byron Bilyeu of Junction City. Andy Nail, a brother, resides near Stockton, Cal., and Mrs. Tilda Murray, a sister, resides in Los Angeles. Another sister, Mrs. Armitie Bear, lives at Fairfield, Wn. Seventeen grandchildren and two great grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church in Scio, Rev. Henry Albert officiating. He paid a splendid tribute to the life and character of Mrs. Bilyeu who, with her husband, had been a member of the church here for a number of years. The casket bearing the remains was conveyed to and from the church between columns of lady members of the Scio Rebekah lodge of which the deceased had long been a member. Favorite hymns of Mrs. Bilyeu were rendered by the choir. The pall bearers were Fred Bilyeu, W. A. Ewing, Henry Hassler, Ed Myers, Fred Roadmeyer and Riley Shelton.

At Franklin Butte cemetery, where the body was laid to rest, the impressive ritualistic ceremony of the Rebekah lodge concluded the rites.
