

TENTED CITY SPRINGS UP AT WOODBURN PARK

CAMP MEETING CHURCH OF GOD IS UNDER WAY

Woodburn—The annual camp meeting of the Church of God, which for more than 30 years has been held at the camp ground just north of Woodburn, opened Thursday night and will continue until Sunday night, July 27. The address of welcome was given by Rev. L. E. Neal, pastor of the local church with the response by Rev. C. H. Hatch, pastor of the Salem church. Rev. G. H. Gray of Grants Pass gave the opening address.

Rev. F. G. Smith of Anderson, Indiana, editor of the Gospel Trumpet, will be one of the principal speakers during the session. Others who will speak at various times will be Rev. J. J. Gillespie of Salem, Rev. Russell Green of North Bend, Rev. H. A. Norman of Oregon City, Rev. W. T. Benton of Portland, Rev. C. K. Chapman of Eugene, Rev. E. H. Ahrendt of Vancouver, Wash., Sister Strasser of Portland, Rev. Mary Jarvis of Seaside, and many others.

From 300 to 500 people are expected to be in attendance coming from all over the state of Oregon, a large number from Montana, California, Washington and Idaho and some from eastern states. A regular tent city is in the process of erection, with all modern conveniences, including electric lights and city water, and a cafeteria where those who wish may obtain meals. A postoffice, grocery store and book store are also to be found on the grounds for the convenience of campers. Four regular services are held each day with special services scheduled in between and the public is invited to attend any or all of these services, which are held in the large tabernacle.

Myers is described as being five feet 10 inches high, dark complexioned with black hair streaked with gray and weighing about 160 pounds and is 69 years of age but is very active and may be taken for a younger man. When last seen he was dressed in light gray hat, black trousers with field gray stripe, blue black coat and brown tennis shoes. He also has a noticeable scar above his left eye.

Myers owns between 1,800 and 2,000 acres of land in the Marquam section and has lived here all of his life and has left the place only on rare occasions. He lives alone as his wife died 30 years ago.

Myers left his home for Eugene to visit his half sister, Mrs. Frank Ridings on July 3. He stayed one night there and then went to Albany where he visited Ben Adams. Myers had lost a valuable dog and he wanted to know if Adams, who formerly lived on one of Myers' farms knew of the dog. Saturday, July 5 he took the stage from Albany, presumably for home. It was reported that he took the stage for Eugene and from there to Creswell but an investigation produced no clues.

ACTION FILED FOR DAMAGES

Albany—R. A. Kester has filed suit in circuit court here naming Albert Sternberg as defendant and is seeking nearly \$25,000 damages. He is asking for \$25,000 general damages and \$907 special damages.

The plaintiff alleges that Sternberg, who is the owner of the Albany Tanning company, did not live up to an oral agreement, in which the plaintiff alleges Sternberg authorized him to buy furs for the tannery, writing his own personal checks and later being reimbursed by the Albany Tanning company, through a Portland bank, Kester writing the drafts on the cannery himself.

The plaintiff alleges that Sternberg failed to honor the drafts and those to whom he had written his personal checks, which were not honored by the Portland bank, aware of a complaint and had Kester arrested.

Kester alleges himself unable to pay the outstanding checks, and is seeking damages.

LOGGING OPERATIONS RESUME AT MOLALLA

Molalla—Two extra stages from Portland to Molalla were used to bring the men in to start work at the Eastern and Western Logging company camp which started operations Thursday. The camp closed down June 29 for the holidays and has been closed less than three weeks.
