Dallas—The program of water sports and contests will be the chief entertainment feature at the annual picnic of the members of the Polk County Jersey Cattle club and the 400 or 500 boys and girls who are members of the 4-H clubs of this county. The picnic is to be held in the Dallas city park Saturday, July 26. Arrangements are in charge of a committee of the Jersey Cattle club consisting of G. C. Hesitt, W. O. Morrow and S. H. Robinson and County Agent J. R. Beck.

Arrangements have been completed whereby the park board has agreed to turn over the facilities of the park from 10 until four on that day. They have also agreed to see that arrangements are made for the holding of the water sports in the fine swimming pool. According to Mr. Beck these picnics are largely for the purpose of getting acquainted and enjoying a holiday from the vigorous work of summer and there will be no long winded speeches of any kind.

All the boys and girls are urged to bring their bathing suits as there will be contests for different boys and girls of the various ages in the swimming pool. A special invitation is extended to the parents of these club members to attend the picnic also. Where ever parents are unable to attend along with their youngsters Mr. Beck states that provisions are being made to guard against any accident by having the swimming pool suitably patrolled.

Since the recent improvements the swimming pool is suitable for both experienced swimmers and little toddlers who can just barely wade as special provisions have been made for all ages.

There will be the usual picnic dinner at noon time preceded and followed by water sports. Each club group is to bring its own lunch.
