

PROMOTION OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS PLANNED

SCIO DISTRICT FUTURE BRIGHT TURNIDGE SAYS

Scio—Promotion of the berry industry in particular and fruit and agriculture in general in the Scio region is the objective of W. J. Turnidge, Sunnyside, Wash., according to announcements made by him in this city.

Turnidge was formerly engaged in business at Crabtree but left there about 20 years ago. He has been investigating the small fruit possibilities of this community for several weeks and is convinced a great future is in store for those who will engage in the berry business judiciously and follow it intensively.

Strawberries, raspberries, loganberries and many other varieties of small fruit will pay big returns to the grower in the forks of the Santiam, in the opinion of Turnidge. Vegetables also can be produced in abundance, he asserted, and fruit and vegetable culture to the capacity possible here would maintain many canneries and prove a source of heavy revenue much needed in the region, Turnidge said.

Stimulation of fruit and vegetable growing here is only one of Turnidge's forward movements, according to plans announced.

Products must be found for the products and that is one of my main objects in coming back to the forks of the Santiam," he said, and added that he was making extensive plans in this direction. "Whether Scio operates a cannery for the handling of the thousands of tons of fruits and vegetables possible in this section of the country will depend almost entirely upon the growers.
