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## PIONEER SPOTS ARE VISITED BY BROOKS PEOPLE

Brooks—Rev. and Mrs. George Cole and Mrs. Cole's mother, Mrs. J. S. Dunlavy, have returned home from a two week's vacation spent in Oroville, Calif., guests of Mr. Cole's parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Cole and family.

The party made the trip by auto and report the roads in excellent condition, even the detours being paved. Many places of interest were visited, among them Bidsell Bar, in Butte county, California, where stands the mother orange tree of California, planted by Judge Joseph in 1856. The tree is eight feet around and casts a shadow 45 feet in diameter at the noon hour. They also viewed a huge gold dredger, located about 20 miles south of Oroville.

Rev. and Mrs. George Cole and Mrs. J. S. Dunlavy and Mrs. E. W. Cole, motored to Sacramento, a distance of about 90 miles from Oroville, and spent the day. While there they visited Fort Sutter, where Capt. John A. Sutter built his first protection against the Indians in 1839, where many relics are preserved at this fort. They also visited the state capital grounds, which consist of about 35 acres of beautiful park, with its palm trees, weeping cypress and magnolia and many other different trees and plants which have been transplanted from every continent and climate.

A portion of the park, known as the G. A. S. grove is composed of trees from all the principal battle fields of the Civil war. Saplings transplanted from the battle fields, and dedicated to the memory of Civil war veterans, was of special interest to Mrs. Dunlavy, her father being a Civil war veteran.

From Sacramento they went to Stockton, where they were overnight guests at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Guldor, and Edward and Edith Schurt, nephew and niece of Mr. Cole.

Rev. and Mrs. Cole and Mrs. Dunlavy visited Mrs. Briggs, at Durham, Calif. Mrs. Briggs has about 40 acres of almonds, which are about ready to harvest. Mrs. Briggs is the mother of Rev. William Briggs, former pastor of the Brooks, M. E. church.

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
