

KNIVES AND TEAR GAS USED IN COUNTY FRACAS

FILIPPINO CREW LANDS IN JAIL AFTER ATTACK

Woodburn—Four Filipinos, employed on the Derring farm one mile west of St. Paul, created some excitement Monday afternoon in a general mix-up in which knives and tear gas were used in a battle of three against one.

The trouble started over a money settlement for labor and as the affair became heated the three aggressors threw tear gas into the eyes of their victim and then attacked him with knives and fists. He was not seriously injured, however, suffering only a cut in the leg of his trousers and a slight flesh wound, and was able to get to Woodburn where he swore out a complaint, charging the three with assault and battery.

Constable W. C. Miller drove to St. Paul to bring in the culprits, being warned that the crowd was well supplied with guns, but had no trouble in bringing them to Woodburn where they were taken before Judge Overton and entered a plea of not guilty.

The judge placed each of the trio under \$50 bonds, which they were unable to raise, and they are now resting in the city jail, where they will remain until Wednesday morning, when their trial will take place in the justice court at 10 o'clock.
