

PROPOSED HIGHWAY CHANGE INTERESTS ALBANY

DOUBLE HAZARD RAIL CROSSING MAY BE VETOED

Albany—The Oregon Public Service commission held a meeting with city, county and railroad executives in Albany Tuesday to air plans to eliminate the dangerous dual railroad crossing on the Pacific highway at the north part of Albany near Geary street. At this junction the Southern Pacific and the Oregon Electric railway tracks cross the highway.

The circuit court room was filled to overflowing, inasmuch as some of the grade elimination plans proposed would change the course of the Pacific highway from Murder creek to Main and First streets, scores of owners of business property along the affected section were interested spectators. Such a change would adversely affect their properties and it is believed a financial ruin for them.

A committee to report on its findings in 90 days was appointed with Roy Klein, secretary of the state highway commission; C. H. Leonard, Albany and Linn county engineer; Eugene Lester of the public service commission and an engineer each from the halves of the two railroads, the men to be selected by the railroads. Chairman P. J. Miller of the public service commission, who presided, named the committee.

The first plan was presented by Klein, eliminating the underground crossing at Murder creek and projecting the highway at this point toward Albany on the river side of the Southern Pacific tracks to the point where the Southern Pacific tracks converge a few miles beyond Albany. Then the highway could follow between the tracks, and enter Albany at Main or Water streets, he said.
