

ONE FILIPINO FOUND GUILTY ASSAULT CASE

Woodburn—A jury trial was held in Judge Overton's court Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, when the three Filipinos, arrested Monday for assault and battery upon a fellow countryman following a fracas in which knives and tear gas were said to have played a prominent part.

The defendants were represented by Blaine McCord while Lyle Page took care of the state's interests. A fair sized crowd assembled and was rewarded by hearing the numerous questions answered in broken English, which at times proved very amusing.

The jury, which consisted of Geo. Miller, N. S. Scollard, Bert Butterfield, William Scollard, A. H. Reiling and Henry Layman, after a short period of deliberation brought in a verdict of guilty against Gerardo Turman, one of the three defendants, the other two being found not guilty. Judge Overton imposed a fine of \$25 and costs, which amounted in all to \$77.95, which was paid by the Filipino friends of the accused thus releasing him from further confinement.
