Directors of school district No. 3, Baker county, not only have a legal right, but it is also their duty to call a second election on adoption of the district budget, says an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle. The budget was rejected at the first election. It is a third class district.

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The state of Oregon must furnish its district attorneys with seats of the new Oregon code and trust the next legislature to provide money to pay for them, says an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle to Secretary of State Hoss. In the case of circuit judges the codes may be paid for from their expense fund and appropriated by the 1929 legislature in addition to their salary appropriations, but in the case of the district attorneys the legislature did not provide an expense fund. The opinion holds that members of the legislature are the only officials entitled to the codes free of charge.

In the distribution of the state elementary school fund to school districts of the state, which is according to number of teachers employed with a maximum of one teacher allowed for each 30 pupils or fraction thereof, a school's enrollment and not its average attendance shall be the basis. This is the opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle in reply to an inquiry from State School Superintendent Howard. Therefore the department of education has considered enrollment to be the average daily attendance.

One more of Salem's allies would be given a name if the city council gives favorable consideration to a petition submitted to that body Friday by a number of property owners in the block surrounded by Capitol, Chemeketa, 12th and Court streets. These property owners, taking their cue from others in that district ask that the alley intersecting this block from east to west be called "Motor Way." The signers of the petition include Maud A. It will be necessary for the city council to pass an ordinance before the alley can be officially named.

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TEN DIVORCES NONE OPPOSED IN SINGLE DAY

Ten divorce decrees were granted Friday morning by Circuit Judge McMahon after hearing testimony. Loriel Gillette was granted a decree from Clarence J. Gillette accompanied by an agreement of separation between the parties in which their property affairs were adjusted. Under the agreement he is to pay his former wife \$50 a month for the support of his minor child until he is 21 years of age, and in addition to pay her \$85 a month for 12 months and an additional \$25 a month for 12 months. She surrenders all her interest in his real property. He agrees to take out a \$2,000 life insurance policy in favor of their child and maintain it and to also continue maintaining a \$5000 policy of which she is beneficiary. He also agrees to pay a note of \$7500 to a third party on which they are joint signers and on payment of the note stock in the Forest Grove News Times put up as security for the note to be placed in escrow to insure payments on the life insurance policy. He also gives to her all their personal effects.

Cassie J. Willoughby gained a decree from Joseph E. Willoughby on a charge of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Albany in November, 1921, and had a child, her maiden name of Cassie Margaron and given custody of two children.

Maudie J. Royston in addition to being given a decree from W. H. Royston is also given custody of a child and \$25 a month for its support.

Elde Teal is restored her maiden name of Elde Gennar in her decree against Charles J. Teal. They were married in Salem in September, 1922.

Property settlement was also made out of court in connection with the decree granted Paul Woods from Marie Woods on ground of desertion. They were married in Marion county in March, 1929.

A decree to Vallie Johnson from Vestal A. Johnson is based on cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Oklahoma in April, 1928.

Regina R. Caulfield is given a decree from Earl Thomas Caulfield, and also he is to repay \$1000 advance by the plaintiff for his benevolent repayment to be made at the rate of \$25 a month. They were married in Marion county in September of 1927. He was named as co-respondent in another divorce proceeding which has been pending in circuit court.

Custody of two children and \$30 a month support money are given Elsie M. Thompson in a decree of divorce from Marion M. Thompson. They were married in Polk county in November, 1925, and she alleged desertion.

Elsa Frey was awarded a decree from J. H. Frey on ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Idaho in 1916.

Antoinette Clement Casy secured her decree from John P. Casy on ground of desertion. They were married in Portland in December, 1915.

James Brickford was arrested here Friday by Salem police and is being held for Crook county authorities who hold a felony warrant for him. The nature of his offense is not known here.

Mahoney is said to have been injured by the collision. He was taken to the hospital and is recovering. The bus started to pass him without a warning signal. John Currie, driver of the bus, says he failed to see Mahoney's signal. Considerable damage was done to the Mahoney car.

An order restraining Rich L. Reimann, local realtor from disposing of any of his property real or personal pending proceedings in circuit court in the case of Fred J. Siewert against Rich L. Reimann has been granted in an order by Judge L. H. McMahon. In addition Reimann is ordered to appear before the court September 12 and show under oath any interest he may claim in any property.

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TWO PRISONERS TRY ESCAPE FROM GUARDS

Two young prisoners, L. Gorbam, 20, serving 3 years from Umatilla county for burglary and A. Suleby, 21, doing two years from Lane county for larceny, were unsuccessful in an attempted break from the state penitentiary early Thursday afternoon. They were working in one of the several flax grass east of the penitentiary proper, near the railroad spur leading to the asylum to the north of the prison. That is the only portion of the institution grounds unprotected by the high wire stockade. Guards re-captured them.

BOY CATTLE RUSTLERS FAIL TO MAKE SALE

Eastern Oregon has no monopoly on the cattle rustling business, in the belief of Deputy Sheriff Burkhardt who Friday reported that two boys, one 10 and the other 7, had taken a cow belonging to Linn Davidson of the Indian Hill ranch on the northeast outskirts of the city, had led the animal down the road and made an unsuccessful effort to sell her for \$5.

The boys left home early Thursday, determined to see a bit of the world. It didn't take them long to discover that a few dollars would come handy. Seeing the cow staked out in a pasture on the Davidson ranch the youngsters proceeded to lead her away.

"Want to buy a cow, mister?" they asked of a man when they met on the road.

"What do you want for her?" "Four dollars, cash."

The man went on without closing the deal.

Friday morning the cow was found near Potter's corner south of Davidson's ranch, the boys evidently having failed to make a sale abandoned the animal.

The boys at first denied any knowledge of the animal but finally admitted that they knew quite a bit about the affair.

The cow is worth approximately \$75.

JULY UPHOLDS DROUTH RECORD

Just enough moisture to "get on the books" is reported for the month passed, the rainfall for July being .61 inch on July 2 with just a few drops reported in some sections of the city late the night of July 27. The mean average for the month is .53 inches.

Since precipitation records available for Salem were established in 1892, there have been eleven July's without sufficient rainfall to be measured with a trace record for the month passed with .61 inches while three July's were slightly drier, .62 inches of rainfall being reported in 1901, 1908 and 1917.

Only four July's have exceeded an inch in precipitation with July, 1916, the wettest on record, a total of 2.72 inches being recorded for the month. July 1909 was next with 1.92 inches and July 1902 with 1.81 inches and 1925 with 1.21 inches following in order.
