LONG SERVICE PERIOD ENDED BY REV. SIMPKIN

Dayton—Rev. P. A. Simpkin, 64, a resident of Dayton who died at the home of his son Dr. John M. Simpkin at Marshfield, August 1, was born May 23, 1866 at Wigan, Lancashire, Eng. As a young man he came to the United States, provided himself a successful business man but gave up business to become a minister in the Congregational denomination.

His first pastorate was in Wisconsin, then for three years he preached at Gallup, N. Mex. then in 1900 he became pastor of Phillips Congregational church in Salt Lake City, resigning after 21 years service because of broken health, but the church refused to let him go entirely and kept him as pastor emeritus. After a year in Santa Monica and San Francisco he was able to return to work but could not live in the high altitude of Utah, so was persuaded by his friends, the lumbermen, to devote his time to them as international organizer for their fraternal order of Hoo Hoo, and in this capacity he traveled all over the United States and Canada.

He is survived by two sons, Dr. John M. Simpkins, Marshfield, and Joseph W. Simpkins, Salt Lake City, and one daughter, Mrs. Guy S. Anderson, Salt Lake City.

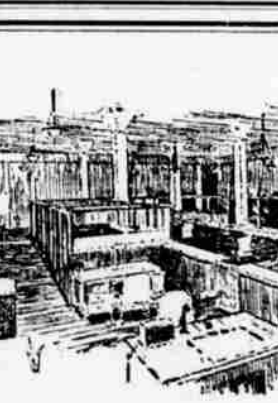
