

DALLAS GOLFERS TO HAVE CHANCE SMALL COURSE

Dallas—A miniature golf course which will be owned and operated by H. M. Beck and C. Trapp is under construction.

The course, situated on the north side of Court street, immediately adjoining the Gail hotel, will be known as the Ames and Andy course. Beck says it is the intention of the owners to make the layout as attractive and pleasing to the eye as possible. Several features not found on other courses are included in the plans.

The lot was purchased from Otto Williams, the consideration not being disclosed. While this is Beck's first venture, Trapp has had quite a lot of experience along these lines, being at present, owner of a course in Hood River. Present plans call for considerable landscaping on the property and probable installation of a fountain in the immediate foreground.
