

YACHT SINKS AT COWES; KING GEORGE SEES WRECK

STEWART LOSES LIFE WHEN TWO BOATS COLLIDE

Cowes, Isle of Wight (AP)—A steward was drowned and a racing yacht, the Lucilla, owned by J. Lauriston Lewis, was sunk in a collision at the start of the Royal Regatta events Wednesday. King George, aboard the Britannia, witnessed the tragedy.

King George saw the accident from the Britannia, which at the time was leading in the race for big yachts with the Astra, White Heather, and Westward not far behind.

The Lucilla, which was the stern boat, about two and a half minutes behind the Britannia, collided with the Astra, which was the lead boat, and went to the bottom in three minutes. The Lucilla's crew was rescued.

When the crew of the Lucilla came ashore it was stated William Saunders, a steward on the sunken craft, had lost his life. The flag on the motorboat Marjorie, owned by Lewis, was flown at half mast.

The Britannia won the race, which was exceedingly close throughout and thereby scored her 200th victory.

The result was a popular one with the crowds ashore, particularly as the king was aboard, and there were rousing cheers when the royal craft crossed the line ahead, winning from White Heather by half a minute.

But for the presence of the Washington Senators in the American League, the New York Yankees might be up there fighting the Athletics for leadership. As it is, however, Babe Ruth and company are battling in third position, ten games back of the champions and not much chance of gaining ground as long as they are scheduled to play Walter Johnson's Senators.

The Senators have beat the Yankees in 12 of their 15 meetings this season. The Yanks succeeded in breaking the jinx Tuesday but not until the Senators had won their seventh straight by taking the first of a doubleheader 6 to 4. Charlie Ruffey was largely responsible for the Yanks' 7-1 triumph in the curtain game. He put his team out in front with a homer in the second inning.

The Athletics failed to take advantage of Washington's even break, losing a 4 to 3 game to the Boston Red Sox.

Detroit put over four runs in the eighth to give Earl Whitehill his eighth consecutive victory, the Tigers defeating the Indians 5 to 4. Three of Cleveland's four runs were unearned.

The Giants and Robins furnished another one of their spectacular contests in the National League, Brooklyn finally winning 9 to 8 in ten innings. The Giants trailed 6-1 going into the ninth but a five-run rally sent the veteran Adolph Luque to the showers and tied the score. Two more were added in the tenth but the league leaders fell on Bill Walker for three runs and the game in their half of the frame.

The Cubs kept pace with the Robins, scoring three runs in the ninth to defeat the Cardinals 5 to 4.

Fred Frankhouse held the Phillies to six hits as the Braves gave Philadelphia a 6 to 2 defeat.

In order that all who participate may have an equal chance at the prize, it has been decided that no woman can win more than twice in one month.

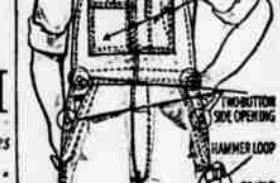
The Wednesday evening tournaments for men have proven quite popular and President Needham of the club believes it will not be long before many women will be participating in the regular Friday contests.

Jacksonville, Fla. (AP)—One hundred seventy-seven municipal golf links champions from 26 cities continued play Wednesday over the Jacksonville city course, but without the presence of the defending champion.

Carl F. Kauffman of Pittsburgh, champion of the past three years, was disqualified Tuesday night when he and his partner, Guy McCall of Buffalo, could not agree with the United States Golf association officials on the counting of a putt.

The official statement said: "The competitor with whom he (Kauffman) played in the qualifying round marked on the score card a four instead of a five for the ninth hole. The error was wholly unintentional but the rules state no alteration can be made after the card has been returned. Unfortunately Kauffman did not check the score before he handed in his card."

Harry T. Givan of Seattle, Wash., turned in a 36-37-73, one over par, to lead the field in play Tuesday. Bob Wingate, Jacksonville city champion, and Al Quigley, Chicago, were tied for second place with 37-37-74 each. Joseph S. Green, Philadelphia was third with 40-33-75. Kauffman's disputed score was 82 or 83.
