

ALBANY GIRL IS SPIRITED AWAY IN AUTO

Albany—The May Goin, 14, daughter of Dr. J. W. Goin, of Albany who is the center of a habeas corpus suit, was spirited away from her father's home here Wednesday night, it came to light Thursday, when the aid of Lin of Lincoln was sought in regaining the custody of the child.

It is believed the girl was taken away by relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Chute, who started the habeas corpus suit and who claim that the father of the child surrendered his right to her, at the time of the death of the girl's mother, in giving the child to them to care for.

Chute is an uncle of the Goin girl, and the case is at present under advisement by Judge L. H. McMahon of Salem.

The girl was sitting on the porch of the Goin home, when witnesses state, a roadster drew up to the curbing across the street, and a woman in the car said, "Come here, honey." She then went to the car and got into it and was whisked away.

East June 11 came to Albany to visit her father and in July the Chutes applied for the habeas corpus writ and Dr. Goin filed a demurrer to the action to resist it. The plaintiff's allege that the child has become extremely nervous while kept away from them.
