DIPPING OF SHEEP KEEPS CREWS BUSY

Dayton—J. W. Kudna and sons Albert and Harry of Woodburn, are busy in the Pleasantdale vicinity at the George Dorsey, George Foster and J. A. McFarlane farms dipping sheep with creosote solution in portable tanks, especially constructed on a truck and trailer.

From two to three hundred animals can be treated in a day, according to length of the wool. Early in the season just after shearing, as many as 600 have been dipped in one day. They began this season's work at St. Paul June 6 and since that time have dipped 6000 animals. This is the first time that such a convenient dipping method has been available in this locality.

The Kudna family has been residents of Woodburn since August 4, 1929. They formerly resided in Lake county.

REGISTRATION OF PICKERS IS NOW UNDER WAY

Independence—Hop pickers are sending in their requests for registration cards, and the growers are beginning to realize that the hop-picking season is near at hand. The early fuggles will be ready between the 15th and 20th of August and these followed closely by the early clusters and late clusters about September 1.

The pickers are registering earlier this year than usual and soon the vanguard will be arriving. Many automobiles laden with their earthly possessions are beginning to put in an appearance already and are seeking locations to camp so they may be on the grounds to get into the early picking.

Growers are disposed to give the local people preference and it is their desire to have all available local families to register early. Pickers from different coast states are sending in their applications, many who have not been in the hop fields before, and it begins to look like there would be plenty of help to harvest the crop.

So far the hops look good on the vines, growers have put more work on their crops and have been to a greater expense to save them, than for many years.

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TOASTED TUNA SANDWICHES

1 can White Star Tuna
1 cup mayonnaise
1 teaspoon salt
dash cayenne
1 tablespoon lemon juice
8 slices toasted bread

2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons anchovy paste
8 ripe olives
1 large tomato
15 head lettuce
2 oil pickles

Mix Tuna, mayonnaise, salt, cayenne, and lemon juice. Cream butter and anchovy paste and spread this on slices of toast. Add Tuna mixture to half the toast slices, cover with remaining slices, garnish with lettuce, slices of tomato, sliced pickles, and olives.

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
