

BEARCATS AND OREGON TO PLAY UNDER LIGHTS

FIRST FOOTBALL GAME AT NIGHT SET FOR EUGENE

University of Oregon, Eugene (AP)—The University of Oregon will install floodlights on its football field this fall, thereby becoming the first college in the northwest to play under lights.

The first night game in Eugene probably will be played against Willamette September 26.

Contracts to install General Electric equipment on Hayward field were to be awarded Wednesday by the interim committee of the executive council, the governing body of student affairs in the summer months when regular school is not in session. The cost of installation will be approximately \$4,000.

Twelve poles 70 feet above the ground will be installed, six on each side of the field, and 20 feet apart. Fifty-six lights, single reflectors of 1000 volts each, will be utilized. The light will be directed down on the field, but will produce no glare.

The equipment is to be in place by September 15, when fall football practice starts officially. It is expected that the players will drill nightly the first two weeks, until school opens, to accustom them to playing at night, as Oregon's first important contest is a night game at Soldiers field, Chicago, against Drake university on the night of October 3.

SHAMROCK DUE AT NEW LONDON BEFORE NIGHT

Steam Yacht Erin (AP)—The Erin, conveying Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock V, expects to reach New London, Conn., at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

The weather was fine Wednesday and the two boats which are bound for the international yacht races off Newport next month made better time than they had expected, as they first believed they would not reach New London until Thursday.

The Shamrock will be put into a boat yard on arrival at New London and equipped with her special racing rigging.

She will be taken to the eastern end of Long Island sound for tests.

Meanwhile the four American defense yachts will start their elimination trials next Wednesday, and a final defender is expected to be chosen by August 30.

The international series will begin September 13.

Dazzy's Ragged Sleeve Puzzles Cubs No Longer

Chicago (AP)—Dazzy Vance's "shirt sleeve diplomacy" no longer worries the Cubs.

For several seasons, the "Dazzler" caused considerable consternation among the Cub hitters by shearing the right sleeve of his undershirt to shreds. Each time he pitched, the shredded sleeve fluttered and the Cubs got it mixed up with the ball so regularly they fanned and fanned.

Last season, the shirt got so ragged and the strikeouts victims among the Cubs totaled such a staggering figure that Manager Joe McCarthy registered a mild but futile protest.

So this year, the Cubs were told to forget the ragged sleeve and watch the ball. Result: The Cubs have defeated the Flatbush pitching ace six times in seven starts.

Eugene (UP)—Ralph Hill's sensational mile run of 4:12.4 in a dual meet with Washington last spring has been officially recognized as the world's intercollegiate record.

Word to this effect was received by Bill Hayward, University of Oregon track and field coach, from Alonzo A. Stagg, director of athletics at the University of Chicago and chairman of the National Collegiate Athletic association track and field meet committee.

SUAREZ TAKES DECISION OVER PERLICK TWIN

New York (AP)—Justo Suarez, a hard hitting lightweight from the Argentine, has made his second appearance in the United States and given the fight fans something to talk about. Stacking up against the more experienced Herman Perllick of the Kalamazoo, Mich., twin brothers, the rugged South American belted out a ten round decision Tuesday night at the Queensboro stadium to the satisfaction of the referee, the two judges and a crowd of 6000 which paid \$9000 to see if Suarez was as good as he looked when he licked old Joe Glick in his first appearance here.

The 21-year-old Argentine showed plenty of scrap, forcing the fight from start to finish. At times his blows were wild but when he did connect they hurt. Suarez turned back the Michigan youth even more decisively than did Jackie Berg, the English lightweight and outstanding challenger for Al Singer's crown.

RACING YACHT CALLS FOR HELP

San Pedro, Calif. (AP)—Coast guard officers received a radio message requesting immediate aid Tuesday night from the yawl Contender, returning from Honolulu after completion of the yacht race begun here July 4.

The Contender gave her location as 400 miles northwest of the harbor. It carries the full racing crew of 25 persons. Coast guard officers said from the tone of the message they believed the craft partially had been damaged, the vessel asked fuel to be sent. Under ordinary conditions, they said, the ship could sail in without assistance from its auxiliary engine.

The coast guard ship Algonquin, under command of Muller S. Hay, station en route at 11 p. m. with fuel and provisions, and probably will reach the Yawl Thursday morning.

The Contender is 106 feet long and is built of steel. It placed second in the race to Honolulu.

The Chicago Cubs were a fraction more than one full game in front in the National league pennant race as they resumed their vital series with the second-place Brooklyn Robins. The Cubs beat the Robins in the first game Tuesday 3-2 after 11 innings to extend the Robins' losing streak to five straight games.

The St. Louis Cards touched their old teammate Willie Shuefeld for 8 hits to defeat the Boston Braves 4-2. Lindsey stopped a 9th inning rally by the Braves when he struck out two men with the tying runs on bases.

Powerful hitting carried Pittsburgh to a double win over the Philadelphia Athletics 8-7, and 8-3. The first game went 14 innings.

New York and Cincinnati opened a four game series Wednesday after a day of rest.

The Philadelphia Athletics continued their triumphant march toward a second American league pennant by taking both ends of a doubleheader from the Cleveland Indians 9-1 and 7-0.

Babe Ruth hit No. 43 as the New York Yankees nosed out Detroit 6-5. Bobby Reeves singled with the bases loaded and two down in the ninth to give the Boston Red Sox a 5-4 win over the St. Louis Browns.

Fast fielding beating Washington's 4-4 defeat of the Chicago White Sox. The two teams executed five double plays.
