FARM IRRIGATION FOR NORTH HOWELL

North Howell—Two farm irrigation projects are in operation in the North Howell district, on the Mike Hopper farm, and on the A. T. Cline farm.

Hopper has one acre of vegetables under irrigation. His plant includes a 2 1/2 inch pump and a trough and ditch distribution system. On the Cline farm, a four acre tract of Elterberg strawberries is being watered, as well as squash, potato and hay plantings. Experiments are to be tried on clover and corn fields. Cline's system employs water from the Pudding river through a tractor driven 4 inch pump and canvas hose and ditch distribution system.

BUMPER WHEAT CROP

Mt. Angel—John Beyer completed harvesting a bumper crop of wheat on his five acre field. He threshed 359 bushels, machine measure. This was grown on new land, previously planted with a crop of potatoes.
