

FIRE DESTROYS THOMASON BARN TURNER FRIDAY

Turner—The barn and contents on the J. F. Thomason place in the north-east part of town was completely destroyed by fire Friday afternoon. Thomason had started the fire in the lane leading past the barn to rid the lane of dry grass as a fire protection to the house and buildings nearby, but a brisk west wind soon fanned the flames out of his control. By the time assistance arrived the barn was a mass of flames and efforts were confined to keeping the fire from spreading to other buildings. Volunteers manned the fire hose and strung hose from a hydrant but as the wind was carrying the embers away from buildings only a small amount of water was used. Wet sacks and water carried from a well used to put out the grass fire which burned freely in a fence row.

Five tons of baled hay had just been stored in the barn the day before, none of which could be saved. Thomason, who is an elderly man, was nearly exhausted by his efforts to fight the fire before the alarm was sounded. No stock was in the barn at the time the fire started. Some insurance was carried on the building but none on the contents.

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RAMSDALL DIES SUDDENLY WITH HEART DISEASE

Dallas—Oscar C. Ramsdell, 68, died suddenly at his home on Main street Thursday evening at 5 o'clock. Death was due to heart disease.

Oscar Callihill Ramsdell was born in the Waldo Hills on January 8, 1862. He was a son of the Rev. Thomas M. Ramsdell and Lorilla J. Caldwell, early pioneers of 1844 and one of a family of 13 of whom only two now survive.

He was married to Melvina S. King at Kings Valley on January 29, 1887, and in 1888 he united with the church. From that date he took an active part in all church work and until a few months prior to his death he was class leader in the local Methodist Episcopal church.

Five children were born of the union: Sievert A. Lawrence O. Claude C. Myrtle W. and Edith L., of whom two, Lawrence O. and Myrtle Gressner have preceded him in death.

He is survived by his widow, two sons, Sievert A. and Claude C., and one daughter, Edith Gates, all of Dallas; a brother, J. A. Ramsdell, and a sister, Anna Anderson, both of Portland.

By his death Dallas has lost one of its best known and best beloved citizens. He has been a resident of this city for the past 23 years and by occupation was a carpenter.

Funeral services will be held Sunday in the Methodist Episcopal church at 2 o'clock with the Rev. J. W. Warrell officiating. Interment will take place in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the Hemkle and Thomas undertaking parlors.

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WILLIAM M'KEY PASSES FRIDAY AT ROSELAWN

Hubbard—William Brannick M'Key, 80, pioneer onion set grower of Hubbard, died at his home at Roselawn Gardens Friday morning. He had been ill for several months with cancer of the neck glands and previous to that he had been taking treatments for skin cancers.

M'Key was born April 13, 1850, in Missouri, his father's name being William B. and his mother, Jane Willams. Together with sisters and brothers the family moved to Lawrence, Kansas, where they remained until 1876 when William went to California. He lived there until 1877 and then settled in Pomeroy, Wash. In 1889 he moved to Hubbard and February 1, 1891 he married Mrs. Corinna Burnett.

Thirty years ago he built the residence on his acre set of Hubbard and has lived there since then. Though other grocers featured onion sets he was the first one to bring them out commercially in this district. He was not only an adept on the peculiarity of the sets but understood soils and horticulture to a nicety. His Roselawn garden home is set in the midst of flowers and shrubs propagated by him from clipping or seedlings.

He leaves his wife and one son, E. A. M'Key, two granddaughters, Dorothy and Phyllis; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Gus Pemier and Mrs. B. McMorris, both of Dayton, Wash., also a brother, C. N. M'Key of Salem, and a sister, Mrs. J. M. Robinson of Pomeroy, Wash.

The funeral has been set for Monday afternoon.
