

PAULSONS BACK AFTER BIG TOUR THROUGH SOUTH

Hubbard—Mr. and Mrs. Paulson and family have returned from their summer vacation spent in the southern, middle west and eastern states. They left home June 18 over the Redwood highway to Eugene, Calif. Four days were spent in San Francisco, Santa Barbara, Hollywood and Los Angeles before going on to San Diego and Tijuana, Mexico.

The Imperial valley going thru the Carrizo Canyon they found a real desert, with sand and mountains on the move. In Phoenix, Ariz., they were entertained with a temperature of 116 but at El Paso it had moderated to 110 degrees.

A bona fide southern thunder storm was encountered at Vicksburg in the evening after a journey on road No. 90 from San Diego to Jackson. At the latter place they turned south and spent the night at Gulf port where they found the Gulf waters for bathing and found that they were comfortably warm. From there the car went on to Lake City, Florida, following road No. 90 after which the turn was made toward the south to Tampa, Port Meyers and Naples. The trail then went east through the Everglades and on to Miami.

The group noticed that the Atlantic coast along there seemed very quiet as the tourist season is in December, January and February. They visited the supposed to be "Fountain of Youth" and also the forts, Meyer and Marion at St. Augustine. These forts were built by Spaniards and were quite interesting with drawbridges and moats, watch tower and time worn gates.

Paulson paid particular attention to the timber of Florida and found that it consisted of cypress, royal palm, coconut, banana and palm trees. Some of the timbered sections were beautiful with Spanish moss festooning the trees like green drapery.

The Everglades were teeming with wild life, such as pelicans, herons and alligators. In Alabama, Florida and Georgia the Paulsons found many pine forests, the trees tapped for sap for turpentine, rosin and tar.

From Jacksonville the group went on to Florence, going west from there in order to pass through Raleigh, N. C., Richmond, Virginia, from which place they drove into the Shenandoah valley. There they went to the Jefferson home and also the birthplace of Woodrow Wilson at Staunton.

At Winchester they cut across the At Winchester they cut across to Washington, D. C., where four days were spent in sight-seeing. Gettysburg, Harrisburg were visited after which they moved on to Williams Post and Erie. They found Cleveland, Ohio, another Chicago or Los Angeles in regard to fast driving. Mr. Paulson said that the crops in Nebraska, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa and Ohio looked good at the time. Farming and business conditions seemed about the same in all the states they traveled through. It seemed to him that something would have to be done to provide work for the unemployed of the cities.

The tourist business has not yet made it self felt in the east as in the west as cabins for the tourist accommodation are very few. Louisiana and some part of Texas as well as all of Georgia seemed far behind in the good road building program. The group enjoyed the novelty of floating in Salt Lake at Saltair beach in Utah. Yellowstone Park was visited, the party spending four days there. The home trip was made by way of Twin Falls, Idaho, Weiser, Pendleton, The Dalles.

Paulson kept notes of the trip and also an account of the expense. His notes showed that from Gulf Port, Miss., to Washington, D. C., and from there to Erie, Penn., and then west to Omaha there was a continuous pavement with the exception of a 25-mile detour in South Carolina; that the most severe rain storms were encountered in Florida, South Carolina, Wyoming and at Yellowstone Park. His expense account showed that the overhead for the group of five ranged from \$10 a day to \$15 a day. Last year the Paulson family took a somewhat similar trip.
