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Covered Wagon Centennial Attracts Several Thousand Valley People to Champoege

Mt. Angel—The centennial of the first covered wagon starting for the west on the old Oregon trail was observed at Champoege Sunday, at which nearly two thousand people from the Willamette valley were present. The program was under the auspices of the Marion county Knights of Columbus, F. R. Coleman, St. Paul district deputy, was chairman.

Father Francis P. Letpold, Eugene, state chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, traced the various causes that led the American people to the winning of the west.

Frank J. Lonergan, Portland, past supreme director of the Knights of Columbus spoke of the move of 1936, and gave a lengthy talk on the various immigration groups of 1843, 1844, and 1845. Lonergan brought out the splendid qualities of the "father of the Oregon country."

Various letters of commendation for the work of the Knights of Columbus of Marion county were read by Rev. L. A. Sander, McMinnville.
