

WOODBURN WILL KEEP BIG FIRE TRUCK AT HOME

COUNCIL WILL HAVE CHEMICAL SET FOR CALLS

Woodburn—The two questions of importance discussed at the meeting of Woodburn's city council Tuesday evening were the light proposition, in which the council is planning to cut out a number of lights and install some additional ones, and the question as to whether or not the new fire truck should be sent out of the city in case of a fire in the country. Neither question was definitely settled.

The committee on lights was instructed to bring in a written report of the changes desired, after which the matter will be taken up with the light company. It was suggested that three lights be taken from Ogle street and placed on South Front and two more installed, making a total of five, and that several poles on the east side of South Front street be changed to the west side of the street. Other changes were suggested, including the removal of some cluster lights.

Mayor Broyles called upon each councilman in turn to express his opinion relative to sending the big truck out of the city. Evenden gave his opinion that it would do no good to send the truck out to a farm where there was no water system but was in favor of fixing up the chemical to be used for country fires; in case a farmer would put in a suitable water system it would be all right to send out the big truck, with the provision that the fire chief and a suitable crew remain in the city to operate the remaining fire apparatus. Lavesy spoke in favor of sending the big truck to the country but said that farmers should be given assistance according to their own provision for use of the equipment. Hall said it was a poor judgment for the city to buy a \$4000 piece of equipment and then take it from the people who bought it, leaving them unprotected, and that the booster pump was of no service after a fire was well started. Mayor Broyles gave as his opinion that it would be useless to send the big truck to the country under present conditions but is willing to fix up the chemical for this purpose. After all the talk, a motion was made and carried that the fire board ascertain the cost of putting the chemical in first class shape and bring in a written report at next meeting, after which a vote will be taken as to what should be done about fires outside the city.

An application for a street light on North Second street in front of the Durant property was read and referred to the committee in charge of lights.

A report was made of tank wagons from threshing machines coming into the city and taking water from the hydrants without permission.

The matter of slow payments on a number of improvement funds was brought up and the treasurer was instructed to write to delinquent property owners, notifying them that steps will be taken soon to foreclose on the property unless some provision is made for payment.

A complaint was made of the stages parking double on the highway at the arch street and obstructing the view of motorists driving out on the highway from Young street. This will be brought to the attention of the proper authorities.

An ordinance was passed establishing the grade of Bradley street. Reports of city officers were approved and filed.

LATE GOVERNOR FARM SOLD FOR BIG CASH PRICE

Dallas—A return on the sale of real personal property of the estate of the late Governor L. L. Patterson was filed Tuesday morning by Mary Patterson, widow and executrix of the estate.

Under the terms of the will the executrix was empowered to sell or dispose of all property of deceased towards payment of debts by public or private sale without order or direction from the probate court at a price and on whatever terms seemed most advantageous to her.

She therefore, on August 14 disposed of the property to B. O. Schunking and Agnes M. Schunking, of \$20,000. The sale was in every way regular and was the best and highest obtainable price offered.

She now seeks to have the sale affirmed by the court giving her authority to turn over to the purchaser the necessary deed.

ELECTRICAL STORM SETS FOREST FIRE

Albany—Another thunderstorm passed over the summit of the Cascade mountains in the Santiam national forest late Monday, and left a lightning fire, C. C. Hall, supervisor of the forest, announced Tuesday.

The fire was near Duffy lake, close to the summit and was quickly extinguished by a force of firefighters rushed to the scene. The forest is extremely dry, Supervisor Hall said, and close watch is being kept for fires.

MONMOUTH LUMBER FIRM FACES SUIT

PELICAN IS SHOWN AT MOSQUITO BAR

The bird is judged to be an old one by those who are familiar with the species. It was captured Friday in the Willamette river near Mosquito Bar by the proprietor, George Singer and Walter Johnson, and will be shown there until Sunday.

The bird was made heavy by the numerous fish it had eaten but even then it was a sight to behold. The wing spread of this bird measures eight and a half feet and it stands about two feet high. The formidable looking bill is one foot long and has a pouch on the lower one which may be distended to hold several fish. The bird probably left south central Oregon because of dry lake beds and is rarely ever seen in this part of Oregon. It had been previously captured by two Salem youths who freed it unharmed.
