

WOMAN WITH RIFLE BLOCKS ROAD CONSTRUCTION

COURT DISPUTE OF THOMPSONS' YET UNSETTLED

Albany—Mrs. Henry Thompson of near Sweet Home, greeted county road workers Friday with a rifle, when they started to construct a county road connecting the Sweet Home bridge with the Santiam highway about a quarter of a mile this side of Sweet Home. The road was to traverse property which is being disputed in court and is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Thompson. L. G. Lewelling, district attorney was telephoned by the threatened men and the sheriff and his chief deputy were dispatched to the scene.

The strife is the outgrowth of a condemnation suit filed by the county against Mrs. Thompson and her husband to establish the value of the right of way for the road. The county offered the Thompsons \$200 for the land and the Thompsons asked the county \$1500 for the quarter of an acre of land to be used.

Under the law of eminent domain, the crew had authority to proceed with the construction until the suit was settled and Linn officials told Mrs. Thompson she was transgressing the law.

Late in the afternoon the men resumed their work and Mrs. Thompson came to Albany to consult her lawyer. She stated her husband had told her to keep the men from working on the disputed territory and that she had used the rifle to make them retreat.
