STATE POMONA LEADERS TALK DURING EVENT

Silverton—As a result of the decision of Silverton Hills Pomona conference in June, the annual grange church day and the annual picnic day were held in one meeting, the forenoon meeting given over to the devotion services and the afternoon to an informal picnic, more of a secular nature, at Coolidge and McClain park.

More than 250 grangers representing the 13 patrons of husbandry organizations in Marion county from the groups at Salem, Turner, Macleay, Woodburn, Butteville, Ankeny, Stayton, Silverton Hills, Union Hill, Monitor, Fairfield, North Howell and Silverton, gathered to enjoy the day with a community dinner served at noon in the park, and two programs with the Rev. Charles C. Hulet, master of the state grange, with offices at 708 Seventh street, Albany, and Dr. D. V. Poling of the faculty of the Oregon State college, Corvallis as principal speakers.

A mixed chorus of 40 voices under the able direction of Martin Rostvold, of Monitor, every order in the county being represented in the group, was an appreciated attraction with Mrs. Ethel Fletcher at the piano.

The devotion program from 11 until 12:30 o'clock, announced by Pomona Master, Lambert, consisted of a sacred number, "Come Thou Almighty King," by the chorus, the address of welcome by Norris Ames, president of the Silverton chamber of commerce, who handed over the keys of the city and the old swimmin' hole to the visitors, and told of the city of Silverton's desire to cooperate with the producers of the profitable marketing of crops, with an able response by W. A. Jones, grange county deputy, master of Macleay grange. The chorus sang a second number, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," and the scripture reading of the 23rd Psalm, and John 10:1-18 was given by Charles Swaneey, captain of the junior drill team, Monitor grange.

The speaker of the morning program was Rev. C. Hulet, who spoke "not as a grange master, but as a minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ" on the subject of the teachings of Jesus Christ as the "world's greatest undeveloped resource" and being the fundamental of all that is good in the Christian world.

From 2 to 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon an informal secular program with Dr. Poling at the chair, was in order. Mrs. Zella Parrish of Silverton sang, "When Irish Eyes are Smiling," and "For You," with Blanche Young at the piano. Lyman McDonald, baritone of Salem sang, "Sing Along" and responded to a hearty recall with "Springtime in the Rockies." Mrs. McDonald was piano accompanist; both Mrs. George W. Vinton of North Howell, with a vocal solo, "The Rose Man's Garden," accompanied by Mrs. Myro McKenney of Turner, and Mrs. McKenney singing "In the Garden of My Heart," with Dr. Poling at the piano, were warmly received. Dr. Poling's talk was an interesting application of the request for the building of three temples, one for Moses, typifying law; one for Elijah, reform; and one for Christ, a type of redemption to the modern progress of learning, culture and general aesthetic appreciation of the fine work of the granger movement.
