

CIRCUIT COURT DATE SET BACK ONE FULL WEEK

Albany—Circuit court for Linn county has been postponed from September 2 to September 9, by presiding Judge Percy R. Kelly, who will conduct a case in Salem next week. Eight civil cases are docketed for this term, making it the largest number of cases scheduled in a number of terms.

Three prisoners indicted by the grand jury in session this week, pleaded guilty to the charges against them and received sentence. Fred Mendosa, indicted on a larceny charge of stealing turkeys, pleaded guilty to simple larceny and received a jail sentence of 30 days. J. D. Darbie likewise drew a 30 days jail sentence when he pleaded guilty to the charge of writing a check without sufficient funds in the bank to cover it.

Ray Brown, Halsey, indicted on a forgery charge, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary, and was later paroled to his attorney. Brown waived indictment by the grand jury and pleaded guilty to an information filed by the district attorney.

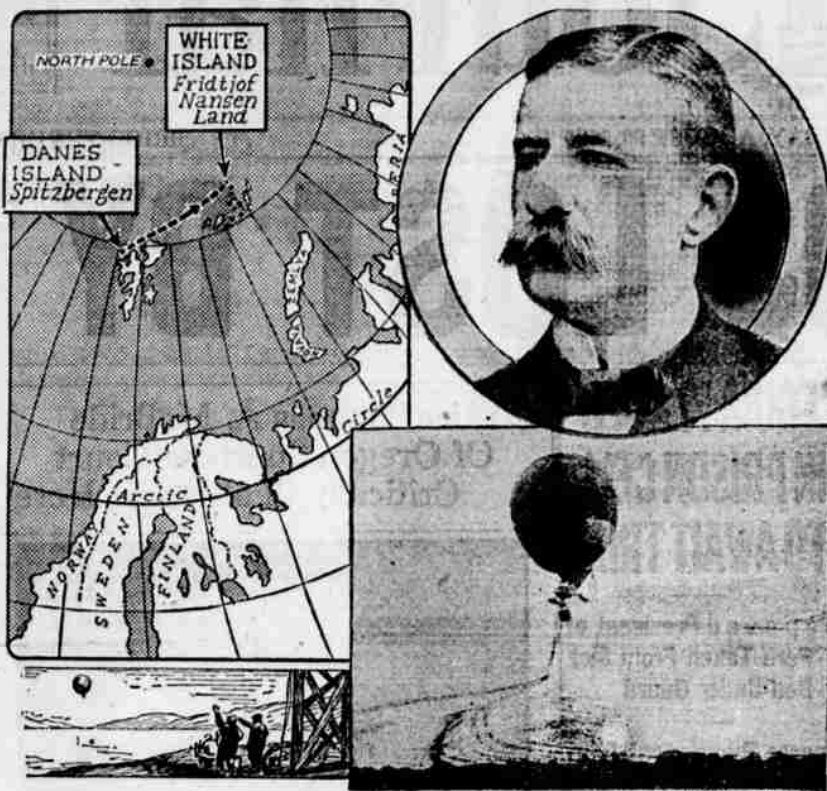
